2	in the above-entitled cause.)
3	HONORABLE BATES: Good evening. My name is
4	Fredrick Bates. I'm an attorney in private practice
5	here in Chicago. I am not an employee of CPS.
6	On or about April 3, 2013, the Chief Executive
7	Officer, or the CEO, of the Chicago Public Schools
8	retained me to serve as an independent hearing officer
9	in connection with this matter.
10	The purpose of this hearing is to enable me to
11	receive public com comments from concerned persons,
12	specifically including representatives of the CEO,
13	members of the local school council, parents, members of
14	the school staff, the principal and representatives of
15	the Chicago Teachers Union and interested members of the
16	public concerning the CEO's Proposal to Reconstitute
17	Thomas Chalmers Specialty Elementary School pursuant to
18	105 ILCS 5/34-8.3(d)4 of the Illinois School Code.
19	Notice of this hearing was served on the
20	parents, staff members, principal and members of the
21	local school council.
22	Pursuant to that notice, this hearing was
23	scheduled to begin at 8:00 p.m. this evening, and I'd
24	like the record to reflect that we began this hearing at

- 1 8:00 p.m.
- 2 Pursuant to the directives provided in the
- 3 document entitled Procedures for Public Hearings on
- 4 Proposed School Reconstitutions, the Hearing Officer is
- 5 solely responsible for conducting the hearing and
- 6 determining the total number of persons who will speak
- 7 at the hearing. The Hearing Officer may impose any
- 8 limitations necessary to ensure that the proceedings are
- 9 orderly and efficient.
- I want to hear from as many people as possible
- 11 this evening so I ask -- I have some ground rules that I
- 12 would ask everyone to respect.
- This is a public hearing. I will expect
- 14 everyone in this room to comport their conduct to
- 15 reflect that fact. Anyone who fails to do so will be
- 16 removed.
- 17 Please turn off your cell phones or put them on
- 18 vibrate. Do not clap or cheer if you agree with
- 19 something someone has to say, do not boo if you are
- 20 opposed to what someone has to say.
- This is an opportunity for public comment
- 22 regarding the CEO's rec -- recommendation. It is not an
- 23 opportunity for questions and answers.
- I reiterate to you, I am not an employee of

- 1 CPS. I do not have any answers to any questions.
- I will attempt to conduct an orderly hearing,
- 3 and, I assure you, I will respect everyone in this room.
- 4 I will insist that you respect me by abiding by the
- 5 ground rules that I've just set forth.
- 6 I will receive comments from representatives
- 7 from CPS first concerning why they are proposing to
- 8 reconstitute Chalmers Elementary School. Then I will
- 9 hear from the individuals who have signed in to speak
- 10 today primarily in the order they have signed in until
- 11 everyone who signed in before 9:00 p.m. has been heard
- or until we reach the hour of 10:00 p.m., whichever
- 13 occurs first.
- 14 Individuals who have signed in to speak during
- 15 the designated hours to do so will each be given two
- 16 minutes to present their comments.
- 17 Dr. Nolen --
- That's N-o-l-e-n?
- 19 DR. NOLEN: Yes, sir.
- 20 HONORABLE BATES: -- the principal of the school,
- 21 has asked for an accommodation, which I have agreed, and
- 22 that accommodation is to allow W.T. Harris from six to
- 23 eight minutes to speak and to have that be the first
- 24 speaker after the CPS case, and I will accommodate that

- 1 request.
- 2 A certified court reporter is seated to my
- 3 left, your right. She is here to transcribe this
- 4 hearing. She cannot record two people speaking
- 5 simultaneously. Therefore, if I have a question for
- 6 you, I would ask you to please stop speaking, listen to
- 7 my entire question and then answer. She cannot record
- 8 us both talking at the same time.
- 9 Is there a need for a sign language or
- 10 Spanish-speaking interpreter?
- 11 (No response)
- 12 HONORABLE BATES: Would you ask in Spanish?
- 13 THE SPANISH INTERPRETER: (Spanish language).
- 14 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. There are interpreters
- 15 present if -- if they are needed.
- When you are called upon to speak, I would ask
- 17 that you come to the microphone, adjust the microphone
- 18 so that it is reasonably close to your mouth, please
- 19 state your name, your full name, and spell your full
- 20 name, then please state your affiliation with Chalmers.
- Following the public hearing, pursuant to state
- 22 law and the procedures promulgated by the board
- 23 governing this hearing, I will prepare and submit to the
- 24 CEO a written recommendation and summary of the public

- 1 comments and documents received at the hearing this
- 2 evening.
- Finally, the record in this case will remain
- 4 open until 5:00 p.m. tomorrow for persons to submit any
- 5 written materials they want me to consider and make a
- 6 part of the record.
- 7 Those materials should be submitted either in
- 8 person to the CPS Law Department on the seventh floor of
- 9 this building or via e-mail to qualityschools.edu,
- 10 that's one word, qualityschools.edu. Materials
- submitted after 5:00 p.m. tomorrow will not considered
- 12 in my recommendation and report.
- My report will be issued sometime before the
- 14 next board meeting. With that said, will the
- 15 representative of the CPS please call your first
- 16 witness, introduce yourself?
- MS. YAHNIG: Thank you, Mr. Hearing Officer.
- And before I call my witness and introduce
- 19 myself, I'd like to make one correction. The e-mail
- 20 address is qualityschools@cps.edu for the record.
- HONORABLE BATES: Okay.
- 22 MS. YAHNIG: Thank you.
- 23 HONORABLE BATES: Qualityschools@cps.edu?
- 24 MS. YAHNIG: Correct.

- 1 Thank you very much.
- 2 My name is Esther Yahnig, E-s-t-h-e-r
- 3 Y-a-h-n-i-g, and I am an attorney in the Chicago Board
- 4 of Education's Law Department.
- 5 I'm appearing before you today in connection
- 6 with the Proposal of the Chief Executive Officer, or the
- 7 CEO, of the Chicago Public Schools to Reconstitute
- 8 Thomas Chalmers Specialty Elementary School or Chalmers.
- 9 Throughout the CEO's presentation today,
- 10 witnesses may refer to this Proposal as a reconstitution
- 11 or as a turnaround.
- 12 (Document marked.)
- MS. YAHNIG: At this time, I would like to ask that
- 14 you admit into the record the CEO's compiled Exhibit 1,
- 15 which is a binder of documents already tendered to you
- 16 and being submitted for your consideration in support of
- 17 this Proposal.
- A copy of this binder is also available here in
- 19 board chambers on the ledge behind me for public
- 20 viewing.
- The binder consists of evidence and written
- 22 statements demonstrating that the CEO's Proposal
- 23 complies with the Illinois School Code and with Board
- 24 policy. Specifically, the written statements and

- documents demonstrate the following:
- 2 At Tab A, the binder includes the notice
- 3 letters to the parents and guardians of students, school
- 4 administrators, faculty, staff, and local school council
- 5 members at Chalmers.
- 6 Tab A also includes an affidavit attesting to
- 7 the delivery of notice to the Chalmers parents or
- 8 guardians, school administrators, faculty, staff and
- 9 lo -- local school council members.
- 10 At Tab B, the binder includes the Illinois
- 11 School Code Provisions on the Board's powers and the
- 12 remediation and probation of attendance centers.
- This tab also includes the Board's policies on
- 14 school performance, remediation and probation for the
- 15 2011-'12 and 2012-'13 school years.
- Tab B also includes the CEO's procedures for
- 17 public hearings on proposed reconstitutions.
- 18 At Tab C, the binder includes written evidence
- in support of the CEO's Proposal. Tab C includes the
- 20 written statement of Ryan Crosby and the accompanying
- 21 presentation and supporting documents demonstrating that
- 22 Chalmers was placed on probation and failed to make
- 23 adequate progress in correcting deficiencies after one
- 24 year.

1	Tab C also includes the written statement of
2	Chandra James and supporting documents demonstrating
3	that Chalmers has an improvement plan and budget for
4	correcting deficiencies and has been provided with
5	support from the network.
6	Finally, Tab C includes the written statement
7	of Alice Henry and accompanying presentation describing
8	the reconstitution method and how it is expected to
9	improve outcomes at Chalmers.
10	At this time I'd like to request that the CEO's
11	compiled Exhibit 1 be admitted into the record.
12	HONORABLE BATES: Counsel, CPS compilation 1 has
13	been marked for identification and will be received into
14	the record in this case.
15	(Document received.)
16	(Document marked.)
17	HONORABLE BATES: I would also note that the
18	principal tendered to me the Thomas Chalmers School
19	presentation which has been marked for identification as
20	School Exhibit 2, and I'm going to receive that into
21	evidence as well.
22	(Document received.)
23	HONORABLE BATES: I would note for the record that,
24	having reviewed the material behind Tab A, my opinion

- 1 certainly will note that notice required by law has been
- 2 provided.
- 3 MS. YAHNIG: Thank you.
- I would now like to ask permission to call the
- 5 CEO's first representative Ryan Crosby, who will make a
- 6 statement in support of the Proposal. Mr. Crosby's
- 7 statement is located in the binder at Tab 8.
- 8 HONORABLE BATES: Mr. Crosby, please have a seat,
- 9 state your name for the record, and spell your first and
- 10 last name for the court reporter.
- MR. CROSBY: Good evening. My name is Ryan Crosby,
- 12 R-y-a-n C-r-o-s-b-y.
- 13 HONORABLE BATES: You may proceed, sir.
- MR. CROSBY: I'm the Director of Performance Data
- 15 and Policy for the Chicago Public Schools. In this
- 16 capacity I oversee the implementation of the District's
- 17 Performance, Remediation and Probation Policy or
- 18 Performance Policy and compliance with State and Federal
- 19 School Accountability Policies. I have been in this
- 20 position since June 2012 but have maintained oversight
- 21 of the performance policy since 2008.
- 22 I'm appearing before you today to present
- 23 specific data highlighting the low academic performance
- 24 of Thomas Chalmers Specialty Elementary School. This

- data will be displayed on the PowerPoint presentation
- 2 currently being shown.
- 3 The Chief Executive Officer's proposed
- 4 recommendation that Chalmers be reconstituted is based
- on Section 34-8.3 of the Illinois School Code. There's
- 6 a copy of -- copy of the statute in the binder of
- 7 documents that you have received in support of this
- 8 Proposal.
- 9 Section 8.3 grants the Chief Executive Officer
- 10 and the Board of Education the authority to take certain
- 11 corrective measures with respect to schools with
- 12 academic deficiencies. One of those measures is placing
- schools on probation, which allows the Chief Executive
- 14 Officer and the Board of Education to take additional
- 15 corrective actions intended to correct the school's
- 16 academic deficiencies.
- 17 Specifically, Section 8.3 allows the Chief
- 18 Executive Officer, with the approval of the Board of
- 19 Education, and after a hearing, to reconstitute the
- 20 school if, after a maximum of one year, the school has
- 21 failed to make adequate progress in correcting its
- 22 academic deficiencies.
- The Board of Education has adopted policies
- 24 setting forth the criteria for determining when a school

- 1 is subject to being placed on probation and when it can
- 2 be removed from that status. Specifically, the
- 3 performance policy is the District's school
- 4 accountability policy.
- 5 Under this policy, each school receives an
- 6 annual rating based on its performance on a variety of
- 7 student outcome measures including standardized test
- 8 scores and student attendance.
- 9 This rating is based on a point system. Points
- 10 are received for the school's current level of
- 11 performance and improvement over time on standardized
- 12 tests and attendance as well as the growth of individual
- 13 students from year to year on the state test.
- 14 There are 14 separate metrics on which schools
- 15 are evaluated, each worth up to three points for a total
- 16 of 42 available points. Elementary schools that receive
- 17 less than 50 percent of the total available points earn
- 18 a rating of Level 3 and are placed on probation.
- 19 CPS began using this structure for the
- 20 performance policy in 2008. As you can see, in each of
- 21 the last five years, Chalmers has been a Level 3 school.
- 22 In the 2007-2008 school year, Chalmers received
- 23 35.7 percent of available points. In the 2008-2009
- 24 school year, it received 9.5 percent of available

- 1 points. In the 2009-2010 school year, it received 28.6
- 2 percent of available points. In the 2010-2011 school
- 3 year, it received 42.9 percent of available points, and
- 4 in the 2010 -- 2011-2012 school year, it received 40.5
- 5 percent of available points.
- 6 Prior to five years ago, CPS still had a policy
- 7 determining a school's accountability status. Chalmers
- 8 has been on probation for the past six consecutive
- 9 school years. The notices of Chalmers' performance
- 10 policy status for the last five school years which were
- 11 sent to the Chalmers' principal are included in the
- 12 binder of documents that you have received.
- 13 The next slide shows the results of the
- 14 Illinois Standards Achievement Test or ISAT for the
- 15 2011-2012 school year for Chalmers, the geographic
- 16 network in which Chalmers is located and the district.
- 17 Chalmers is located in the Austin-North Lawndale
- 18 Network.
- 19 The team -- The term geographic network refers
- 20 to the schools that are currently in the Austin-North
- 21 Lawndale Elementary School Network science elementary
- 22 schools located within the community but managed --
- 23 managed independently such as charter schools.
- The calculations used in this testimony exclude

- 1 full-site selective enrollment schools. The reason for
- 2 using geographic network -- the geographic network in
- 3 this calculation was to show how Chalmers is performing
- 4 compared to all other schools within its community.
- 5 As you can see, Chalmers' 2011-2012 ISAT meets
- 6 or exceeds composite score, which is the combined result
- of the ISAT reading, mathematics, science assessments,
- 8 was 54 percent compared to a geographic network average
- 9 of 65.7 percent and a district average of 76.4 percent.
- In reading, the percent of Chalmers' students
- 11 meeting or exceeding state standards was 51.5 percent
- 12 compared to a geographic network average of 63 percent
- 13 and a district average of 73.4 percent. In mathematics,
- 14 Chalmers' performance was 55.1 percent compared to a
- 15 geographic network average of 70.4 percent and a
- 16 district average of 80.5 percent. In science, Chalmers'
- 17 performance was 59.2 percent compared to a geographic
- 18 network average of 59.1 percent and a district average
- 19 of 72.9 percent.
- The next few slides show Chalmers' performance
- over time on the metrics used in the performance policy.
- 22 These slides demonstrate that the performance gap
- 23 between Chalmers and other schools in the network and
- 24 across the district has been persistent over time.

- 1 Chalmers' ISAT composite needs or exceeds score
- 2 was 6.1 percentage points below the geographic network
- 3 average in 2005-2006 and 11.7 percentage points below
- 4 the geographic network average in 2011-2012. Chalmers'
- 5 ISAT composite meets or exceeds score was 21 percentage
- 6 points below the district average in 2005-2006 and 22.4
- 7 percentage points below the district average in
- 8 2011-2012.
- 9 In addition to measuring the percentage of
- 10 students meeting state standards, CPS also measures the
- 11 percentage of students exceeding state standards. In
- 12 2011-2012, Chalmers' ISAT composite exceeds score was
- 13 4.2 percent compared to a geographic network average of
- 9.8 percent and a district average of 18.9 percent.
- 15 Chalmers' composite exceeds score was 2.5 percentage
- 16 points below the geographic network average in 2005-2006
- and 5.6 percentage points below the geographic network
- 18 average in 2011-2012. Chalmers' composite exceeds score
- 19 was 8.5 percentage points below the district average in
- 20 2005-2006 and 14.7 percentage points below the district
- 21 average in 2011-2012.
- 22 Another measure on the performance policy is
- 23 the percent of students exceeding state standards on the
- 24 ISAT at the school's highest grade level. This allows

- 1 us to see how well students are doing as they exit the
- 2 school.
- 3 In 2011-2012, Chalmers' ISAT composite exceeds
- 4 score for its eighth graders was zero percent compared
- 5 to a geographic network average of nine percent and a
- 6 district average of 15.8 percent. Chalmers' eighth
- 7 grade composite exceed score was 2.6 percentage points
- 8 below the geographic network average in 2005-2006 and
- 9 nine percentage points below the geographic network
- 10 average in 2011-2012. Chalmers' eighth grade composite
- 11 exceeds score was 8.5 percentage points below the
- 12 district average in 2005-2006 and 15.8 percentage points
- 13 below the district average in 2011-2012.
- 14 The performance gap between Chalmers and the
- 15 district is consistent across subjects.
- 16 Chalmers' ISAT reading meets or exceeds score
- was 5.9 percentage points below the geographic network
- 18 average in 2005-2006 and 11.5 percentage points below
- 19 the geographic network average in 2011-2012. Chalmers'
- 20 reading score was 19.1 percentage points below the
- 21 district average in 2005-2006 and 21.9 percentage points
- 22 below the district average in 2011-'12.
- Chalmers' ISAT mathematics meets or exceeds
- 24 score was 8.1 percentage points below the geographic

- 1 network average in 2005-2006 and 15.3 percentage points
- 2 below the geographic network average in 2011-2012.
- 3 Chalmers' mathematic score was 23.4 percentage points
- 4 below the district average in 2005-2006 and 25.4
- 5 percentage points below the district average in
- 6 2011-2012.
- 7 Chalmers' science scores fluctuated between
- 8 2006 and 2011 before showing a large improvement in
- 9 2012. Chalmers' ISAT science meets or exceeds score was
- 10 0.4 percentage points above the geographic network
- 11 average in 2005-2006 and was 0.1 percentage points above
- 12 the geographic network average in 2011-2012. Chalmers'
- 13 science score was 19.1 percentage points below the
- 14 district average in 2005-2006 and 13.7 percentage points
- 15 below the district average in 2011-2012.
- In addition to standardized test scores, the
- 17 CPS Performance Policy evaluates schools on attendance
- 18 rate. The attendance rate for Chalmers had been
- 19 consistently lower than the district average until the
- 20 2011-2012 school year when it was 96.7 percent, compared
- 21 to a district average of 95.3 percent.
- The value-added metric, which is compo -- which
- is component of the performance policy, compares student
- 24 academic growth on the ISAT at a school with the growth

- 1 of similar students across the district. This is done
- 2 through a regression methodology that controls for nine
- 3 student-level factors including grade level, prior
- 4 performance and the ISAT, free or reduced lunch
- 5 eligibility, race or ethnicity, mobility, participation
- 6 in the Students in Temporary Living Situations Program,
- 7 Individualized Education Program or IEP status, English
- 8 language Learner status and gender. Controlling for
- 9 these factors allows us to see how much impact the
- school had on its average student over the past year.
- 11 Because we control for prior performance, this metric
- 12 allows us to identify schools with low test scores where
- growth is rapid and schools with high test scores where
- 14 growth is slow.
- The value-added metric is a standardized
- 16 measure with a mean of zero. Standardization means that
- 17 the score is reported in standard deviation units, which
- is a measure of how far away the school's score is from
- 19 the district average. A positive number means that
- 20 students at the school are growing at a faster pace than
- 21 similar students in the district.
- For example, a positive 1 indicates that the
- 23 school is one standard deviation above the mean, meaning
- 24 that the school -- school's students are growing at a

- 1 faster pace than approximately 84 percent of schools in
- 2 the district. A score near zero means that students at
- 3 the school are growing at about the same pace as similar
- 4 students in the district. And a negative score means
- 5 that students at the school are growing at a slower pace
- 6 than similar students in the district.
- 7 Chalmers' reading value-added score was
- 8 negative 2.3 in 2009-2010, 1.2 in 2010-2011 and negative
- 9 2.11 in 2011-2012. Its mathematics value-added score
- 10 was 0.5 in 2009-2010, negative 0.7 in 2010-2011 and
- 11 negative 1.7 in 2011-2012.
- This means that, on average, students at
- 13 Chalmers grew at a below-average pace in reading and in
- 14 -- and mathematics in two of the last three years.
- As a point of reference, Chalmers' reading
- 16 value-added score of negative 2.1 in 2011-2012 was in
- 17 the second percentile, and its math value-added score of
- 18 negative 1.7 was in the fourth percentile.
- 19 To conclude, Chalmers Elementary School is on
- 20 probation in accordance with state law and the
- 21 performance policy. The school has low performance this
- 22 performance is consistently low across subject areas,
- 23 and the school is not making sufficient progress in
- 24 catching up to the rest of the district.

- 1 Thank you, Mr. Hearing Officer. This concludes
- 2 my statement.
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you, Mr. Crosby.
- I don't have any questions of this witness.
- 5 You can call your next witness, please.
- 6 MS. YAHNIG: Mr. Hearing Officer, I'd now like to
- 7 call the CEO's next representative Chandra James, who
- 8 will make a statement in support of the Proposal.
- 9 This statement is located in the binder at
- 10 Tab 11.
- HONORABLE BATES: Ms. James, please come forward,
- 12 state your name for the record, and spell your first and
- 13 last name, please.
- 14 Good evening.
- MS. JAMES: Good evening.
- My name is Chandra James, C-h-a-n-d-r-a
- J-a-m-e-s.
- 18 I am em --
- I am employed by the Board of Education of the
- 20 City of Chicago as the Chief of Schools for the
- 21 Austin-North Lawndale Elementary School Network.
- 22 Chicago Public Schools are divided up until --
- into networks, managed by a Chief, and provide support
- 24 and oversight for the schools assigned to them on behalf

- 1 of the CEO.
- 2 Chalmers is within the Austin-North Lawndale
- 3 Elementary Network, and I am responsible for support and
- 4 the oversight of Chalmers on behalf of the CEO.
- 5 By way of background, I have been an
- 6 educational professional for more than 25 years. I've
- 7 been an elementary school science lab teacher, and I
- 8 have held a number of leadership positions within the
- 9 Chicago Public Schools system, including Elementary
- 10 Science Manager and the Director of the Office of
- 11 Mathematics and Science. I have served as an
- 12 administrator in the Austin-North Lawndale Network where
- 13 Chalmers is located as a curriculum coach, Deputy Chief
- 14 of Schools and now as Chief of Schools. I hold a
- 15 Bachelor's degree in speech pathology/audiology and a
- 16 Master's of education from Cambridge College in
- 17 Cambridge, Massachusetts.
- 18 Chalmers has been on probation for six
- 19 consecutive school years for failing to meet CPS
- 20 required standards for minimum student performance.
- 21 As my colleague Ryan Crosby testified, the
- 22 school has demonstrated low academic performance across
- 23 subject areas and students are not growing at the rate
- 24 consistent with other comparable schools in the

- 1 geographic network and the district.
- 2 Based on the performance policy and my
- 3 observations, I have concluded that Chalmers has made
- 4 insufficient progress in improving student academic
- 5 achievement.
- 6 Through my review of the Chalmers School
- 7 Improvement Plans, Continuous Improvement Work Plan,
- 8 information I have gained from network staff, my own
- 9 knowledge of the District's initiatives and my work with
- 10 Chalmers since 2011, I am aware of how the district has
- 11 supported Chalmers in an attempt to correct its
- 12 deficiencies during the last several years with
- 13 program -- programmatic, professional development and
- 14 mentoring supports.
- 15 Since Chalmers has been on vaca -- on
- 16 probation, the district has provided oversight of its
- 17 discretionary budget to ensure funds are allocated in
- 18 line with the goals for improved student outcomes.
- 19 Prior to this school year, this was done through the
- 20 School Improvement Plan for Advancing Academic or
- 21 SIPAAA.
- The SIPAAA was created with input from data and
- 23 several stakeholders to identify the key areas where the
- 24 school needed improvement, plan interventions to support

- 1 the school and allocate funds accordingly. The Chief
- 2 provided input in the creation of the SIPAAA, and the
- 3 Board of Education also approved the SIPAAA. Copies of
- 4 the SIPAAA for the 2010 through 2012 Board Reports
- 5 adopting them are located in your binder at Tabs 12 and
- 6 13.
- 7 The network has provided additional supports to
- 8 Chalmers in the effort to correct academic deficiencies
- 9 at the school. During the 2011-2012 school year, the
- 10 network assisted Chalmers in the following ways:
- 11 First, the network Instructional Support
- 12 Leaders or ISL's visited Chalmers, providing coaching
- 13 sessions for teachers on delivering instruction and
- 14 implementing the Common Core State Standards.
- Second, the network secured grant funding and
- 16 coordinated partnerships for Chalmers teachers with
- 17 Loyola and DePaul University. Teacher leaders were
- 18 offered six professional development sessions on middle
- 19 school mathematics provided by DePaul and four
- 20 professional development sessions on middle school
- 21 science instruction provided by Loyola.
- 22 Additionally, Chalmers' principal was provided
- 23 with two professional development sessions on science
- 24 instruction provided by Loyola.

1	Third, the network offered monthly professional
2	development sessions for principals and assistant
3	principals focused on the District's set of principal
4	competencies.
5	Fourth, the Network per facilitated
6	performance management sessions with principal,
7	including the principal of Chalmers, to analyze student
8	data and discuss strategies for monitoring student
9	progress throughout the year using assessment data.
10	Beginning this school year, the district began
11	providing oversight of Chalmers' discretionary budget
12	and goals for improved student outcomes through the
13	Continuous Improvement Work Plan or CIWP. The CIWP is a
14	two-year strategic plan created by a team of
15	participants at the school level with support and
16	guidance from the network chief. A CIWP team consists
17	of six to 12 committed stakeholders, including parents,
18	teachers, the principal and other members of the school
19	community such as the Local School Council
20	representatives.
21	The CIWP team uses data and self-evaluation to
22	set students performance goals, develop strategic
23	priorities, identifies milestones and creates an action

plan for each priority and allocates funds in the budget

24

- 1 to align with its goals and strategic priorities.
- 2 My Network Data Strategist and I provided
- 3 support to the Chalmers Instructional Leadership Team or
- 4 ILT as they developed school goals for the CIWP and
- 5 identified milestones for achieving these goals.
- Additionally, the Network School Improvement
- 7 Coordinator reviewed the Chalmers CIWP and budget to
- 8 ensure that allocations were aligned to the goals for
- 9 improving student achievement.
- The Board of Education also approved the CIWP,
- 11 and copies of the Board report approving the Chalmers
- 12 2012-214 CIWP are located in your evidence binder at Tab
- 13 14.
- 14 The Chalmers CIWP set the following strategic
- 15 priorities and created an action plan for each.
- The first goal was to strengthen implementation
- of the Common Core State Standards in literacy and
- 18 mathematics.
- The second goal was to improve -- was to ensure
- 20 all teachers were differentiating instructional
- 21 strategy.
- The third goal was to improve student science
- 23 instruction to prepare students to meet rigorous
- 24 requirements of college and career readiness.

1	The fourth goal was to facilitate a school
2	climate and culture conducive to accelerated act
3	student achievement and college and career readiness.
4	The Network has provided additional supports to
5	Chalmers this school year in an effort to correct
6	academic deficiencies in the following ways:
7	First, the Network has offered monthly
8	professional development sessions for principals and
9	assistant principals focused on the District's set of
10	principal competencies including instructional practices
11	and school culture.
12	Second, the Network has provided 11
13	professional development sessions for teachers regarding
14	the implementation of Common Core State Standards.
15	Third, I have provided coaching to the Chalmers
16	principal regarding teacher support and constructive
17	feedback. I've observed the principal as he has held
18	conferences with teachers and gave concrete feedback on
19	how to coach teachers and discuss areas for growth.
20	Fourth, the Network ISL's have visited Chalmers
21	seven times to provide coaching sessions for teachers on
22	delivering instruction and implementing the Common Core
23	State Standards.

Fifth, the Network has provided quarterly

24

- 1 professional development for the Chalmers instructional
- 2 leadership team regarding the implementation of positive
- 3 behavior supports for students.
- 4 Sixth, I've led three performance management
- 5 sessions with the principals in my Network, including
- 6 the principal of Chalmers, to analyze student data and
- 7 discuss strategies for monitoring student progress
- 8 throughout the year using assessment data.
- 9 Seventh, the Network held professional
- 10 development sessions with Chalmers' assistant principal
- 11 focused on developing a school plan to increase student
- 12 attendance and monitoring student attendance rates.
- Eighth, the Network's attendance coordinator
- 14 has provided support to Chalmers' administration to
- 15 improve student attendance rates at the school by
- 16 participating in monthly meetings with the school
- 17 attendance clerk, making phone calls to homes of truant
- 18 students and monitoring daily attendance information.
- Despite the supports provided by the district
- 20 in recent years, student achievement -- student academic
- 21 growth at the school has not kept pace with district
- 22 averages. For individual students and for the
- 23 community, there is a -- is an urgent need for the
- 24 performance of Chalmers to improve and to improve

- 1 quickly. According to the CEO -- Accordingly, the CEO
- 2 is recommending that Chalmers be turned around.
- 3 If the Board approves the proposed turnaround
- 4 of Chalmers, students will not be displaced from the
- 5 school. Instead, a new team of administrators, faculty
- 6 and support personnel will be staffed at the school.
- You will hear testimony from Alice Henry next,
- 8 who will explain the turnaround method and why the CEO
- 9 believes it will result in better educational outcomes
- 10 at Chalmers.
- In conclusion, there is an urgent need to
- 12 accelerate student achievement at Chalmers, and prior
- 13 supports and interventions have not produced
- 14 satisfactory results. The CEO believes that a
- 15 turnaround will accelerate student achievement and
- 16 provide Chalmers students with better educational
- 17 opportunities.
- Thank you for your time and attention. This
- 19 concludes my statement.
- HONORABLE BATES: Thank you, Ms. James.
- I don't have any questions for you either.
- You can call your next witness.
- MS. YAHNIG: Mr. Hearing officer, I would now like
- 24 to introduce the CEO's next representative

- 1 Ms. Alice Henry, who will make a statement in support of
- 2 this Proposal.
- 3 This statement is located in the evidence
- 4 binder behind Tab 15.
- 5 HONORABLE BATES: Good evening.
- 6 Please state your name for the record and spell
- 7 your first and last name.
- MS. HENRY: Good evening, Mr. Hearing Officer.
- 9 My name is Alice Henry, A-l-i-c-e H-e-n-r-y.
- I am employed by the Chicago Public Schools as
- 11 the Principal of James Weldon Johnson Elementary School
- 12 or Johnson.
- The CEO has asked me to appear at this hearing
- 14 today to convey to you and the Chalmers school community
- 15 science interested members of the public in attendance
- 16 information on the Academy of Urban School Leadership
- 17 otherwise known as AUSL.
- By way of background, I have served in a number
- 19 of capacities in education including teacher, assistant
- 20 principal and principal. I was the principal of
- 21 Vivian E. Summers Preparatory School before becoming the
- 22 principal of Johnson in 2009. I have a Bachelor's in
- 23 education from Northern Illinois University and a
- 24 Master's in --

- 1 HONORABLE BATES: Excuse me for one second.
- See, that's what I mean.
- 3 Please turn off your cell phones.
- 4 You may proceed.
- 5 MS. HENRY: I have a Bachelor's in education from
- 6 Northern Illinois University and a Master's in
- 7 educational organization and leadership from the
- 8 University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana.
- 9 AUSL is a nonprofit agency that partners with
- 10 CPS to manage schools, including Johnson Elementary.
- 11 AUSL is a proven turnaround provider that has a great
- 12 deal of experience improving student achievement at
- 13 chronically underperforming Chicago Public Schools.
- 14 AUSL manages 25 schools, and seven are dual mission
- 15 CPS schools, which include training academies that equip
- 16 teachers to work specifically in turnaround settings.
- 17 The remaining 18 schools are turnarounds; 16 elementary
- 18 schools and two high schools.
- While the turnaround process is a multi-year
- 20 journey, experience has shown that AUSL turnaround
- 21 strategies create higher performing schools with
- 22 accelerated student ac -- academic growth and other
- 23 indicators of good schools. AUSL has transformed
- 24 schools with disorderly school environments and

- 1 persistently low student achievement into schools with
- 2 positive school climates that are inviting and conducive
- 3 to increasing student achievement and accelerating
- 4 student academic growth.
- 5 The PowerPoint presentation currently being
- 6 shown illustrates AUSL's multi-year success in
- 7 implementing turnaround strategies.
- 8 The first slide compares the percentage of
- 9 students meeting or exceeding state standards before
- 10 AUSL managed the school to the same schools' performance
- 11 in the 2011-2012 year.
- As you can see, AUSL turnarounds have produced
- 13 the following results:
- 14 At my school, Johnson, only 42.1 percent of
- 15 students were meeting or exceeding state standards on
- 16 the ISAT before the turnaround. In year three,
- 17 65.7 percent of students were meeting or exceeding state
- 18 standards.
- 19 At Howe School of Excellence, only 42.8 percent
- 20 of students were meeting or exceeding state standards on
- 21 the ISAT before the turnaround. In year four,
- 22 70.2 percent of students were meeting or exceeding state
- 23 standards.
- 24 At Morton School, only 41 percent of students

- were meeting or exceeding state standards on the ISAT
- 2 prior to the turnaround. At year four of the
- 3 turnaround, 78.2 percent of the students were meeting or
- 4 exceeding state standards.
- 5 At Dulles School of Excellence, only
- 6 48.5 percent of students were meeting or exceeding state
- 7 standards of the ISAT before the turnaround. In year
- 8 three, 70.1 percent of students were meeting or
- 9 exceeding state standards.
- The second slide compares the school's
- 11 performance growth for the last six years to that of the
- 12 district.
- As you can see, every year since 2007, AUSL's
- 14 average yearly increase in the percentage of students
- 15 meeting or exceeding on the ISAT has more than doubled
- 16 the average yearly increase of CPS.
- 17 AUSL has developed a dra -- a data-driven
- 18 framework that is the basis for its plan to improve
- 19 academic performance outcomes at Chalmers, including:
- 1. First, the development of rigorous
- 21 transparent goals for schools, teams and individuals,
- 22 including a high expectations and no excuses climate and
- 23 culture;
- 24 Second, the use of performance management

- 1 systems with cycles of inquiry and data-driven
- 2 intervention;
- 3 Third, the inclusion of high-quality
- 4 instruction through implementation of Common Core State
- 5 Standards to ensure a rigorous instructional program
- 6 that gives students the knowledge and skills needed to
- 7 be college and career ready;
- 8 Fourth, efforts to recruit, retain and motivate
- 9 high-quality staff to meet the needs of the school
- 10 community, including educators with the appropriate
- 11 bilingual language skills and special education
- 12 training;
- 13 Fifth, intervention and tutoring services for
- 14 students who need extra support in reading and math;
- 15 Sixth, advanced data systems and aligned
- 16 assessments that allow staff to identify students who
- 17 need additional assistance early and give them the help
- 18 they need to stay on track;
- Seventh, afterschool programs to give students
- 20 access to additional instruction time to further
- 21 accelerate student achievement;
- 22 Eighth, professional development and coaching
- 23 that give the teachers the strategies and tools needed
- 24 to address diverse needs of students in challenged urban

1 environments; 2 And, finally, extensive curriculum 3 enhancements, including fine and performing arts and 4 athletics to round out the curriculum and extend the 5 students' time at school learning. 6 AUSL's full school turnaround plan also 7 includes improvements emphasizing students' 8 social-emotional behavior with: 9 Effective attendance and discipline policies; 10 Safe and orderly school and classroom 11 environments; 12 Focus on skills related to self-management, 13 responsible decision-making, empathy towards others, 14 espec -- establishing positive interpersonal 15 relationships and determining positive goals; 16 And partnerships with outside agencies that 17 provide additional supports to students and their 18 families. 19 As you can see, AUSL's full school turnaround 20 plan is designed to be a comprehensive approach to 21 teaching and learning. 22 If the Board approves this Proposal, AUSL would

welcome the opportunity to serve the Chalmers school

- 1 Thank you, Mr. Hearing Officer. This concludes
- 2 my statement.
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 4 I don't have any questions for you.
- 5 MS. YAHNIG: Mr. Hearing Officer, this concludes
- 6 this -- the presentation in support of the CEO's
- 7 Proposal.
- If you have any additional questions, we will
- 9 be available to answer them.
- 10 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- W.T. Harris?
- 12 Please state your name for the record, spell
- 13 your first and last name, and state your affiliation
- 14 with the school.
- MR. HARRIS: First name is W.T., W-period T-period,
- 16 last name is Harris, H-a-r-r-i-s.
- 17 I'm a part of the Local School Council, also
- 18 alumni.
- 19 Chicago Public Schools, Chalmers School Local
- 20 School Council, 2745 West Roosevelt Road, Chicago,
- 21 Illinois 60608.
- 22 And Re: Address to the matter of Proposed
- 23 Turnaround of Thomas Chalmers School.
- We, the members of Thomas Chalmers School Local

- 1 School Council, wish to thank you for this opportunity
- 2 to be heard on the matter of CEO's recommended action
- 3 to -- to turn around Thomas Chalmers School to the Board
- 4 of Education of the City of Chicago.
- 5 Please know that, all that we present today is
- 6 what we, the elected Local School Council at
- 7 Thomas Chalmers School, believe is in the best interest
- 8 of the children in attendance at Thomas Chalmers School.
- We fought long, hard and most professionally to
- 10 keep Chalmers open under the public debate around space
- 11 utilization.
- 12 Chalmers' administration filed an appeal to the
- 13 Board published utilization rate but never received a
- 14 response, in Exhibit A.
- Nonetheless, we participated in two community
- 16 forums and presented -- and presented to CPS
- 17 representatives data which supported our position that
- 18 the Board-published utilization rate was inaccurate.
- 19 HONORABLE BATES: Sir, I'm not going to tell you how
- 20 to spend your time, but we're not here talking about
- 21 closing the school and space utilization.
- So if you want to address that, you go ahead,
- 23 but you have a limited amount of time.
- I'd rather hear about what's relevant.

- 1 MR. HARRIS: Following our presentation in the two
- 2 public forums of -- on initial school action based on
- 3 space utilization, we were visited by members of the
- 4 Space Utilization Commission.
- 5 We did not hear anything more on the matter
- 6 until Thursday, March 21st, 2013, where we were informed
- 7 that, although Chalmers had been removed from the
- 8 proposed school closure list, we had been recommended by
- 9 the CEO to the Board to be turned around -- to be a
- 10 turnaround school.
- Our entire school community was completely
- 12 befuddled by this recommendation.
- We are aware that agents of the CPS CEO are
- 14 tasked to present data in comparison [sic] and span of
- 15 school years inclusive of data from the prior
- 16 administration with the intent to demonstrate chronic
- 17 academic failure on the part of current faculty, staff
- 18 and administration of Thomas Chalmers School over a
- 19 number of school years.
- We are here to present quantitative and
- 21 qualitive -- qualitative evidence on the contrary and in
- 22 support of the current faculty, staff and administration
- 23 whom have operated for two complete school years.
- In July of 2010, we extended a four-year

- 1 principal performance contract to our current
- 2 instructional leader, Exhibit C.
- 3 His principal candidate profile summary score
- 4 rate him among the best in CPS, Exhibit D.
- 5 Since his inception, we have had three
- 6 different aerial [sic] network chiefs and three
- 7 different CPS CEO's and three varying measures of
- 8 student achievement; ISAT, Scantron and now NWEA.
- 9 Each newly appointed Chief/CEO has had a --
- 10 different priority goals and hints measures of student
- 11 achievement.
- 12 Year 1, 2010 through 2011,
- 13 Dr. Jennifer Cheatham, AIO Area 9, singularly [sic]
- 14 priority goal was reading achievement and the adoption
- of the Common Core State Standards. That year we
- 16 realized a 15 percent point -- a 15 percent point
- improvement in the percent of children meeting/exceeding
- 18 ISAT Reading Standards. This improvement represented
- 19 the highest gain in reading achievement in Area 9,
- 20 Exhibit E.
- Year 2, 2011 through 2012, we were aligned with
- 22 Ms. Annette Gurley, Chief of School Austin-North
- 23 Lawndale Network, whose priorities were more global in
- 24 pres -- in perspective.

- 1 That year one of many priority goals was
- 2 science achievement. That year, in addition to being
- 3 the only Early Adopter of the Common Core State
- 4 Standards school in Austin-North Lawndale Network, we
- 5 realized a 32 percent -- a 32.2 percent increase in the
- 6 percent of students meeting/exceeding ISAT science
- 7 standards. This improvement represented the highest
- 8 gain in science achievements in the Austin-North
- 9 Lawndale Network, Exhibit --
- 10 HONORABLE BATES: What year was that?
- 11 MR. HARRIS: -- F.
- 12 HONORABLE BATES: What year was that?
- 13 MR. HARRIS: 2011 through 2012.
- Year 3, 2012 through 2013, this current school
- 15 year, we now have Austin-North Lawndale Interim Chief of
- 16 School Chandra James.
- 17 Although her independent priorities are not
- 18 clear, the most recent achievement data available to CPS
- 19 and Austin-North Lawndale is the middle of the year NWEA
- 20 data. This data reflects of 64.8 percent of Chalmers'
- 21 students meeting/exceeding their middle of the year
- 22 growth targets.
- HONORABLE BATES: 68.3?
- MR. HARRIS: 64.8 percent.

- 1 HONORABLE BATES: Meeting or exceeding?
- MR. HARRIS: Meeting/exceeding.
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Okay.
- 4 MR. HARRIS: Meeting and/or exceed.
- 5 HONORABLE BATES: From what area is -- or is that
- 6 composite?
- 7 MR. HARRIS: That would be reading.
- 8 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. Thank you.
- 9 Proceed.
- 10 MR. HARRIS: This places Chalmers amongst the best
- in our ability to take children from wherever they are
- 12 academically and move them forward in Austin-North
- 13 Lawndale Network, Exhibit G.
- We realize we must continue to improve upon our
- 15 student performance compared to national norms, and we
- 16 are committed to doing just that.
- 17 Through our -- Through ongoing weekend
- 18 professional development and partnership with the
- 19 University of Chicago, DePaul University and Loyola
- 20 University, the -- the aforementioned accomplishments
- 21 are evidence of the fact that, when priorities are set,
- 22 we not only meet, we are capable of exceeding them with
- 23 the neighborhood students we are enrolling.
- Presently, we are four performance points away

- 1 from becoming a Level 2 school. This places us in the
- 2 best position in attaining that status among the five
- 3 sister schools the CEO has recommended for the same
- 4 action, Exhibit H.
- 5 Other measures of improvement under the current
- 6 faculty, staff and administrations are as follow:
- 7 A. Our students' attendance rate is 96.6
- 8 percent compared to CPS 94.3 percent, Exhibit 1.
- 9 B. Our teacher attendance rate is 97.6 percent
- 10 compared to CPS 95.7 percent.
- 11 C. Our enrollment has risen from 240 in the
- 12 fall 2010 to 260 in the fall of 2011 to nearly 390
- 13 present, representative of the 43 percent increase in
- 14 student enrollment from 2011 to 2012.
- D. The result of the My Voice, My School
- 16 Survey revealed that we were the -- we were strong or
- 17 very strong in each measured area. The survey result
- indicated that we are well-organized for improvement,
- 19 Exhibit J.
- We have been a welcoming school as evidenced by
- 21 the drastic increase in our enrollment and our ability
- 22 to make increment increases in performance metrics.
- 23 Many families have returned to Thomas Chalmers Schools
- 24 from other nearby schools including schools managed by

- 1 AUSL.
- Because this school community has been vocal
- 3 and collaborative, part of the improve -- provements
- 4 that have taken place since the arrival of the current
- 5 administration, over the past two years, we have
- 6 established a solid foundation in achievement,
- 7 attendance, enrollment, climate, culture and community
- 8 partnership upon which the acceleration of our
- 9 improvement initiatives and outlines are a continuous
- 10 improvement work plan, Exhibit K.
- Whereas the CEO's recommendation to turn around
- 12 Thomas Chalmers School under the management of AUSL is
- 13 concerned, notwithstanding data prior to the
- 14 installation and current administration, the empir --
- 15 the empirical evidence we have presented is in fact
- 16 reflective of a turnaround.
- The CEO has the withal [sic] to recommend a
- 18 turnaround action in any given school year. It is our
- 19 position -- It is our position that we be afforded more
- 20 time with current faculty, staff and administration to
- 21 build upon the foundation which has already been
- 22 established.
- We respectfully petition an independent Hearing
- 24 Officer to disagree with the recommended action and

- 1 afford this co -- current faculty, staff and
- 2 administration the opportunity to continue its work
- 3 toward improving the achievements, outcomes and -- at
- 4 Thomas Chalmers.
- 5 Further, we present the following as it relates
- 6 to AUSL.
- 7 HONORABLE BATES: I'm going to ask you to conclude.
- 8 Go ahead.
- 9 MR. HARRIS: Okay.
- In conclusion, of 30 schools in the
- 11 Austin-North Lawndale Network, 17 schools experienced a
- 12 loss in the composite percentage of students meeting or
- 13 exceeding ISAT standards, 13 Austin-North Lawndale
- 14 Schools experienced gangs. Thomas Chalmers School
- 15 experienced gangs in both the percent of students who
- 16 met and percentage -- and the percent of students who
- 17 exceeded ISAT standards, Exhibit O.
- Nonetheless, we get it, we must accelerate the
- 19 closure of the achievement gap between Chalmers, the
- 20 Austin-North Lawndale network and the district.
- 21 Considering where the school has come from post
- 22 fall 2010 under the current faculty staff and
- 23 administration, much of the heavy lifting has already
- 24 been accomplished. The data we have presented is

- 1 representative of a foundation of achievement upon which
- 2 we are prepared to catapult further achievement
- 3 initiatives.
- 4 If allowed to continue to -- If allowed to
- 5 continue the work that we have begun, we clearly
- 6 understand that going forward we must work with a great
- 7 sense of urgency.
- 8 This proposed turnaround action may be
- 9 reimposed upon Thomas Chalmers School at the direction
- 10 of the CEO at any time.
- We pray that this Hearing Officer holds the
- 12 current faculty, staff, administration accountable for
- 13 the work they have accomplished, not penalizing them for
- work prior to the fall 2010 under former administration
- 15 and allow this current faculty, staff and administration
- 16 more time to demonstrate it -- its ability to do work
- 17 requisite in closing the achievement gaps by saying no
- 18 to the recommend turn -- turnaround action.
- 19 Respectfully submitted, the Members of the
- 20 Thomas Chalmers Local School Council this second day of
- 21 May 2013.
- 22 HONORABLE BATES: All right. Thank you.
- 23 I'd like the record to reflect that the
- 24 exhibits that Mr. Harris was referring to are in School

- 1 Exhibit Number 2, the binder which has already been
- 2 received into evidence and that he was given 13 minutes,
- 3 not six, okay?
- 4 Yeah, I noticed that.
- 5 Okay.
- 6 There's a representative from Alderman Irving's
- 7 office, Tyjuan Cratic.
- 8 State your name for the record, spell your
- 9 first and last name, and state who you're here
- 10 representing, please.
- MR. CRATIC: Thank you. Tyjuan Cratic, T-y-j-u-a-n,
- 12 last name C-r-a-t-i-c, a representative from the
- 13 Alderman Irving's office in the 28th Ward where Chalmers
- 14 School sits.
- 15 Alderman Irving of the 28th Ward is concerned
- 16 about the reconstitution of Chalmers School. He's
- 17 concerned because he has reviewed data which notes the
- 18 improvement of Chalmers in scores -- in the state score
- 19 standards in mathematics and in reading. Since 2001
- 20 Chalmers has improved by 31.7 points in reading and 39.9
- 21 points in mathematics.
- The lack of progress that AUSL has shown at
- 23 schools in the Austin Lawndale -- Austin-North Lawndale
- 24 Network is very concerning to the Alderman, and he

- 1 stands in support of not only the students but the
- 2 parents and the faculty at Chalmers and also with
- 3 Dr. Kent Nolen, who has made great improvement and
- 4 progress during his time at Chalmers.
- 5 If Chalmers is not re --
- If Chalmers is reconstituted, based on the data
- 7 he has reviewed and the data even presented here, he
- 8 feels it would not receive the adequate support which
- 9 students do deserve.
- 10 Alderman Irving stands in opposition of the
- 11 reconstitution of Chalmers School.
- 12 Thank you.
- 13 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 14 Kimberly Jones?
- Again, state your name for the record, spell
- 16 your first and last name for the court reporter, and
- 17 tell me your affiliation with the school.
- 18 MS. JONES: Yes.
- Hi. My name is Kimberly Jones, K-i-m-b-e-r-l-y
- J-o-n-e-s.
- 21 I'm a parent. Before --
- Two years ago, before Dr. Nolen came to
- 23 Chalmers, I have a 13-year-old son, I have a
- 24 six-year-old daughter that attends there, he was a mess.

- 1 He was having problems with his reading, his writing,
- 2 everything. His behavior was a mess and everything.
- Once Dr. Nolen got in and got there, my son has
- 4 brought home A's. Never brought home an A. He's
- 5 brought home B's, C's. He's even reading books. He's
- 6 never ever read a book.
- 7 I came home from work one day, walked in the
- 8 room, he had two books. One was open. I was like, oh,
- 9 my God, I've got to go back to the school and let
- 10 Dr. Nolen know this. I went to school the next day and
- 11 let him know.
- 12 Every day now his behavior has been very good.
- 13 He's at school on time. He listens. His grades has
- 14 came up. Like I said, he's brought home A's. Never
- 15 seen one before on his report card.
- 16 My daughter, she's six. She loves going to
- 17 school. She had a tutor, a substitute teacher, her.
- 18 Teacher wasn't there, and when she came to the car when
- 19 I picked her up, I said, what's wrong? She said, oh, my
- 20 day is just going to be messed up. I said why?
- 21 Ms. Porter wasn't at school today.
- She reads, and she is six years old. She
- 23 reads. She can write. She can spell.
- The school has just been excellent, and the

- 1 staff is excellent.
- Since Dr. Nolen has been there and the rest of
- 3 the staff, they've been doing a great job.
- 4 THE TIMEKEEPER: (Indicating.)
- 5 MS. JONES: And there's nothing else I can say.
- I mean, he's improved the school, he's doing --
- 7 I mean, he's trying his best. All the staff is
- 8 wonderful. And like I say, my son is reading books, and
- 9 that's a -- that's a plus to me.
- I don't know about these scores, but to me, if
- 11 he reads three books a day, that's a plus to me.
- With Dr. Nolen and the rest of the staff,
- 13 they're excellent, and I just appreciate you taking time
- 14 to listen to me.
- Thank you.
- 16 HONORABLE BATES: No. Thank you.
- 17 Kenya Bernard?
- MS. BERNARD: Good evening. My name is
- 19 Kenya Bernard, K-e-n-y-a B-e-r-n-a-r-d.
- I'm a parent and have two children, two boys
- 21 that go to Chalmers.
- HONORABLE BATES: Are you on the LSC, Ms. Bernard?
- MS. BERNARD: Yes, I am.
- 24 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. Thank you.

- 1 MS. BERNARD: And when my boys first started going
- 2 there before Dr. Nolen got there and Ms. Banks, I had
- 3 trouble all the time getting them off to school. By the
- 4 time I got them to school, it was time for them to eat
- 5 breakfast. They didn't want to get up. And I used to
- 6 get phone calls every day about my boys acting up or
- 7 whatnot.
- 8 My son, he was -- My oldest son, he always had
- 9 trouble learning, he has a disability, and since
- 10 Dr. Nolen came in and Ms. Banks along with every -- all
- 11 the other staff, my son, he's 13, getting ready to
- 12 graduate. He used to have F and D's on his report
- 13 cards, and now he's graduating from eighth grade with
- 14 A's and B's.
- I thank -- I thank this staff because this is
- 16 my kid -- these are my kids' second family. They have
- done a wonderful job with my kids, a wonderful job.
- And I feel that, if you turn this school
- 19 around, you're not just going to be breaking up teachers
- 20 and students, you're going to be breaking up these kids'
- 21 other family.
- We work together with our children. I'm not
- 23 just speaking for mine, but I'm speaking for all my --
- 24 all my children. These kids here are all my children.

- We work together, and we just don't -- we just
- 2 don't want our -- we don't want our teachers to leave.
- 3 This is our family.
- 4 And if you -- if you take our teachers away,
- 5 you're going to break up one big happy family. That's
- 6 all I can say.
- 7 Thank you.
- 8 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 9 David Wolfe, I think you have something to
- 10 tender to me.
- 11 MR. WOLFE: Yes, I do.
- 12 Here you are (indicating).
- 13 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- MR. WOLFE: I'm David Wolfe. I'm an LSC member,
- 15 D-a-v-i-d W-o-l-f-e.
- I have a book here from Thomas Chalmers School.
- 17 It's approximately 80 letters from the students and
- 18 approximately a thousand signatures from community
- 19 stakeholders, both petitioning that no action be imposed
- 20 on Chalmers School.
- 21 Thank you.
- 22 HONORABLE BATES: If you don't mind, can we mark
- 23 this as School Exhibit Number 3?
- 24 MR. WOLFE: (Indicating.)

1	(Document marked.)
2	HONORABLE BATES: All right. It will be received
3	into the record as School Exhibit 3.
4	For the record, it is a a binder containing
5	what appears to be a petition that was circulated with
6	numerous signatures, a petition another petition
7	dated February 21, 2013, from the parents and guardians
8	of the school students and then a behind the third
9	tab, a series of letters written by students.
10	It's Exhibit 3.
11	(Document received.)
12	HONORABLE BATES: "Student 1"?
13	Oh, excuse me. Please strike that for the
14	record.
15	Student 1?
16	Can we go off the record for a second, please?
17	(Discussion had off the record.)
18	HONORABLE BATES: Back on the record, please.
19	Student Number 1, please do not use your name.
20	Student 2 and 3, please do not use your names,
21	okay, just tell me what grade you're in, okay?
22	You may proceed.
23	STUDENT 1: Good evening. I am currently an eighth
24	grader, 2012-2013 Class.

1 I've written	a	letter	to	CPS	Board	of

- 2 Education.
- 3 I understand that the idea of bringing AUSL
- 4 into Chalmers Elementary School was thought of due to
- 5 various reasons. I understand that you think this is
- 6 what's best for our school students and community,
- 7 although this good idea for Chalmers to become a
- 8 turnaround school has become a lead problem for faculty,
- 9 staff and student body of Chalmers.
- 10 Chalmers School has been brought against many
- 11 charges and accusations. Some main issues that held us
- 12 captive were student and teacher attendance rates, test
- 13 scores and being on probation, not to mention that we
- 14 were told that we were not using the full capacity of
- 15 our school's building.
- The truth is, even though we've been showing
- improvement and are still on the verge of further
- 18 improvement, AUSL and the Board still wants to turn our
- 19 home around.
- Can you not see the love and joy that we share
- 21 in this school?
- Yes, if you use the excuse of love and joy does
- 23 not teach children to learn, then you're right. Love
- 24 and joy can't teach their children A, B, C's, teach them

- 1 to read or add and subtract. It can't teach them to
- 2 write or to get into a good college.
- But love and joy does open and inspire hearts
- 4 and minds to want to learn, to be willing to be taught
- 5 and to help students to see that their education is the
- 6 key to their life.
- 7 This love and joy that I have found and many
- 8 others have experienced is embedded at Chalmers.
- 9 Teachers and students come to school prepared to learn.
- 10 Students love being taught by teachers that have quickly
- 11 become family.
- 12 Because of this, student and teacher attendance
- 13 rates have increased to 96 and 97 percent. We've been
- 14 ready and prepared for the ISAT from the beginning of
- 15 the year due to afterschool tutoring and reading and in
- 16 math. This has been very beneficial to us as you can
- 17 see over the past two years.
- Reading and ISAT scores have grown from low
- 19 40 percent to above 50 percent while math scores have
- 20 grown from low 40 percent to above 50 percent. In
- 21 science we also went from low 28 percent to 59 percent.
- We are four points away from becoming a Level 2
- 23 school. And in the beginning of the 2010 school year,
- 24 we held about 240 students in our loving home, and that

- 1 number has increased to 390 students.
- We do have the skills and experience to stay
- 3 open for our community and experience to stay open for
- 4 our students. Our progress and recorded success has
- 5 proven a turnaround over the past two years.
- 6 The question is; is it really necessary to turn
- 7 our home around?
- 8 Turning this school around and incorporating
- 9 new staff members into our school only means that you
- 10 will be getting rid of the kid -- of the key to our
- 11 success, the very thing that the Board wanted.
- These teachers are our family, and this school
- is our home. We will stand up against and not stand by
- 14 and watch AUSL or the Board of Education continue to
- 15 threaten to take this school from us.
- I am college and career ready.
- 17 HONORABLE BATES: Indeed, you sound like you are.
- 18 Student Number 2?
- 19 STUDENT 2: Good evening. I am currently an eighth
- 20 grader at Chalmers.
- 21 HONORABLE BATES: Into that microphone, Eighth
- 22 Grader.
- 23 STUDENT 2: I have incredible teachers, and as I
- 24 look at my life today, the things I value most about me

- is my heart, imagination, bravery and my open mind.
- 2 All these things came from how I was taught.
- 3 My teachers here have embedded so many positive things
- 4 in me. They have taught me how to show love in spite of
- 5 how someone has treated me.
- But, most of all, they have taught me something
- 7 that I am going to carry me -- carry with me for the
- 8 rest of my life, and that is education.
- 9 And that is something that I value because,
- 10 without an education, you cannot go anywhere.
- I am glad I have the school I attend today
- 12 because they are preparing me for the real word and
- 13 what's to come ahead of me.
- 14 The younger kids at Chalmers are my
- inspiration. They encourage me to do what I have to do
- 16 seeing that they look up to me as well as I look up to
- my teachers.
- 18 HONORABLE BATES: Can you hold off for one second?
- Excuse me. There's a photographer in the room.
- 20 I would ask you to not take pictures of these minor
- 21 children without their parents' authorization, okay?
- That's all.
- You may proceed.
- 24 STUDENT 2: The younger kids at Chalmers are my

- 1 inspiration. They encourage me to do what I have to do
- 2 seeing that they look up to me science I look up to my
- 3 teachers because they're my role models.
- I have seen so many miracles performed at
- 5 Chalmers.
- 6 Our -- When our doubters told us we couldn't,
- 7 we did. When we were being put down and talked about,
- 8 we kept soaring because we have nothing but leaders
- 9 striving to do their best and be their best, and we
- 10 would not let our dreams and goals die down because we
- 11 have hope.
- Over the years, Chalmers has increased in not
- only their test scores but their attendance also.
- 14 It is very critical that every child makes it
- 15 to school every day because education is a valuable
- 16 thing to hold. Chalmers has discipline, and they're
- 17 very strict about their uniform school rules.
- Turning us into an AUSL school is not the best
- 19 choice for Chalmers because, as you can see, we're doing
- 20 exceptionally well now.
- I admire my principal and assistant principal
- 22 because they know what each and every one -- they know
- 23 each and every one of their students right off the back
- 24 of their heads. They have been such an inspiration to

- 1 me, and without them being our school parents, Mother
- 2 Banks and Father Nolen, we couldn't have -- we couldn't
- 3 have such other.
- 4 So I am asking you to let this family stay in
- 5 unity as we are because, as you can see, we are an
- 6 encouragement to one another, and taking it away is not
- 7 helping the community.
- 8 Thank you.
- 9 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 10 Student 3?
- Tell me what grade you're in, Young Man, and
- 12 pull that microphone down so you can talk right into it.
- 13 STUDENT 3: I am a cur -- current sixth grader now.
- 14 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. Thank you.
- 15 STUDENT 3: In -- In Chalmers School, we students
- 16 have met at one point -- for a reading, math and science
- one -- 1.1 exceeded. Since Dr. Nolen and Ms. Banks and
- 18 all of our teachers came, more people have been
- 19 exceeding the ISAT.
- If they close down the school on the west side,
- 21 where are all the kids going to go?
- The kids in King School, they are trying to
- 23 send them to Pope. Why not send them to Chalmers? Why
- 24 are they sending kids at Bethune to Pope? We are a

- 1 family at Chalmers.
- 2 All the students --
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Did you say Bethune?
- 4 STUDENT 3: Yes.
- 5 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. All right.
- 6 STUDENT 3: All the -- All the students at --
- 7 All the students and the staff are a family.
- 8 We are going up on our scores.
- 9 I love the staff at Chalmers. They are not
- 10 going to leave us now. They are teaching us things that
- 11 we didn't know. Chalmers have -- have already shown
- 12 great improvement doing it again.
- We are going to fight 'til we can't fight no
- 14 more. Okay.
- So the staff won't leave us. Me and my friends
- 16 already said that we are going to go back to the -- to
- 17 the -- to the old days, but they can't leave just yet.
- 18 We are not so much done yet. Now save our staff.
- We -- We can't get turned around. Once again,
- 20 they are the best principals I -- I ever had. It's like
- 21 we're encouraged every year.
- Before Dr. Nolen and Ms. Banks came, all -- all
- 23 of them drug dealers was -- was -- drug dealers were on
- 24 the corner of our school.

- 1 So if you all come to all -- all of the schools
- 2 you trying to turn around and close, you need to see
- 3 what's going on inside of their schools.
- In Chalmers, we are a big family. Please keep
- 5 our staff here at Chalmers because we are improving. We
- 6 don't want them to leave because that's just messing up
- 7 the kids' education and their relationship with teachers
- 8 now don't -- that don't leave us.
- 9 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 10 Robert Moreschi?
- MR. MORESCHI: Robert Moreschi, R-o-b-e-r-t
- 12 M-o-r-e-s-c-h-i.
- My name is Robert Moreschi, and I am a middle
- 14 school math teacher at Chalmers Elementary School. I've
- 15 been at Thomas Chalmers since 2011.
- For the past 13 years, I have worked in Chicago
- 17 as a middle school math teacher with 15 different
- 18 principals in five different schools, all of which would
- 19 be considered a Level 2 -- Level 3 schools.
- Never have I had an administration that would
- 21 last more than two consecutive years. Nor have I --
- 22 have I encountered administration that was completely
- 23 dedicated to the school, involved in the development of
- 24 the curriculum, focused on the culture and success of

- 1 the overall school, the happiness of the faculty and
- 2 staff and the overall development of the students until
- 3 I came to Chalmers.
- 4 The spokesman for the district that provided
- 5 evidence to why Chalmers should be a turnaround school
- 6 stated that the students' attendance was 96.6 percent
- 7 only after the 2011 school year. This increase is -- in
- 8 attendance is in -- directly in correlation with the
- 9 change of the school's administration and new faculty
- 10 hires.
- Prior to the administration, students were
- 12 learning math via computer programs rather than highly
- 13 qualified math teachers. This was based on a revolving
- 14 door of unqualified and inad -- inadequate math
- 15 teachers.
- Upon taking this assignment, I had to break
- down the learning walls built by the previous
- 18 administration.
- 19 Students in math were not -- are now
- 20 accountable for their work and are learning how to learn
- 21 mathematics.
- The mean for the current eighth grade students,
- 23 last year's seventh graders, on the Fall NWEA Math exam
- 24 was 226, six points needed to meet the goal of 232 by

- 1 the end of last -- of the end of this year.
- The mean remained the same during the winter
- 3 of -- winter NWEA based on the curriculum map and the
- 4 timing of the delivery of the material.
- 5 Students are now accountable for their learning
- 6 of math. They are creating video podcasts of their work
- 7 and demonstrating their knowledge of mathematics by
- 8 working on the website I created mathmoreschi.com, where
- 9 they are able to receive immediately feedback.
- 10 Ms. James stated that, on seven different
- 11 occasions, we had Common Core related training sessions
- 12 and/or direct ways to deliver the Common Core Standards
- 13 at school.
- 14 As a teacher in charge of the math curriculum
- 15 for the math middle school, I would have loved to have
- 16 been in those sessions and/or demonstrations.
- 17 Since I've only missed one day in the time that
- 18 I've been at Chalmers, it is hard for me to figure out
- 19 when these sessions occurred.
- In conclusion, with the positive additions to
- 21 the school staff, the dedication of our administration
- 22 and the foundation that has been built in both math and
- 23 reading within the past two years, a turnaround would
- 24 force Chalmers to break down -- break new ground and

- 1 demolish the momentum that we currently have installed
- 2 in the students.
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 HONORABLE BATES: Lois [sic] Lane?
- 5 MR. LANE: You don't have to mess it up.
- 6 HONORABLE BATES: Louis Lane.
- 7 MR. LANE: Well, now that the ice is broken, let me
- 8 say, my name is Louis Lane, I'm an alumni, parent and
- 9 teacher, third grader teacher, at Chalm -- Thomas
- 10 Chalmers School.
- L-o-u-L-o-u-i-s L-a-n-e.
- 12 At Chalmers we do not exclude any students from
- 13 the educational process. We are an inclusive school who
- 14 accepts students from around the Chicagoland area. We
- 15 have students from as far south as 83rd and Houston,
- 16 from as far west as 42 --
- 17 HONORABLE BATES: From 83rd and what?
- 18 MR. LANE: 83rd and Houston.
- 19 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. I know you have a time
- 20 limit, but if I can't hear it, you might as well not be
- 21 talking, and if she can't type it, you might as well not
- 22 be talking.
- So you got to slow down.
- MR. LANE: Like I tell my students, slow down.

1	Okay.
2	from as far west as 4200 and Roosevelt from
3	as far east as 300 East Cermak and far north as 1000
4	I mean 1000 North Augusta.
5	We do not We do not have, nor want, the
6	luxury of excluding students from our enrollment list.
7	When other schools exclude students, we openly receive
8	these students with open arms. These students come to
9	us from different educational levels and needs. We
10	service them all.
11	Most of our students are dealing with
12	homelessness, parents who are unemployed or
13	underemployed, poverty, incarcerated parents who are
14	affected by adish parents who are affected by
15	adishion addictions, mental illness and disabilities.

18 charter schools and turnaround schools.

19 It is no secret that, when these students are
20 rejected, they still must be educated. We, Educators at
21 Chalmers, rise to this challenge daily. These students
22 come to us feeling rejected and looked down upon, and we
23 accept them and service them. These students know that
24 we at Chalmers respect and generally care for them and

This is just a snapshot of why some of our

students are rejected from selective enrollment schools,

- 1 respond beautifully.
- 2 They have an attendance record of at least
- 3 96 percent. When a student feels wanted, loved, they
- 4 perform better. We are a core set of teachers who
- 5 teach, not kick students out because of behavior
- 6 problems.
- 7 Teachers cannot fully demonstrate the ability
- 8 to teach when students before them are already running
- 9 full sprint towards the proverbial college and career
- 10 finish line. When teachers can service an
- 11 underperforming student to a level whereby they begin to
- 12 feel as if they have a brighter future, then you see the
- 13 benefit and full worth of a teacher.
- 14 This is what we do at Chalmers. We accept
- 15 these students, nurture these students and ultimately
- 16 grow these students, not discard them.
- Our data reflects how we have grown these
- 18 students. We have been an underper -- We have been on
- 19 the underperforming school list for six years. I've
- 20 been employed at Chalmers for four. During the last two
- 21 years, we have demonstrated growth, despite students
- 22 everyday difficulties, so much growth that, during the
- 23 2012 ISAT, Chalmers School was just four points away
- 24 from being removed off the underperforming schools list.

- This is in spite of having an above-average
- 2 class size. This is in spite of having students with
- 3 physical and emotional limitations.
- 4 According to the data retrieved by the website
- 5 iirc.niu.ewu, Chalmers has made steady improvements for
- 6 the last two years.
- 7 The last two years should be the data reviewed
- 8 as we have been under a new administration in as many
- 9 years. Our school climate has changed. Our student and
- 10 teachers are more focused, data-driven and results
- 11 oriented.
- During the last administration of the ISAT, our
- 13 growth as a school grew by 1.4 percent according to
- 14 ISBE. The sub-region had a decline of 6.3 percent. The
- 15 district grew by .9 percent. The state grew by 0 -- I
- 16 mean .1 percent.
- 17 HONORABLE BATES: Can -- Can you tell me that
- 18 website again.
- 19 MR. LANE: Www.iirc --

- 22 HONORABLE BATES: -- .edu?
- 23 MR. LANE: -- .niu.edu.

- 1 HONORABLE BATES: Mr. Lane, your time is up.
- 2 MR. LANE: Not a problem.
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 4 MR. LANE: Thank you. Thank you for your time.
- 5 HONORABLE BATES: Tershia (phonetic) Holloman?
- 6 MS. HOLLOMAN: Tertia Holloman, T-e-r-t-i-a
- 7 H-o-1-1-o-m-a-n.
- I am a classroom teacher at Chalmers, and I'm
- 9 going to pick up where Mr. Lane left off.
- Our school climate has changed. Our students
- 11 and teachers are more focused, data-driven and, as a
- result of that, more oriented.
- During the last administration of the ISAT, our
- 14 growth as a school grew by 1.4 percent according to
- 15 ISBE. The sub-region had a decline of 6.3 percent. The
- 16 district grew by .9 percent. The state grew by 0.1
- 17 percent. See Appendix A. The growth of our school
- 18 outpaced our counterparts in comparison to the proposed
- 19 turnaround school AUSL. Our school -- school growth
- 20 outpaced seven of their 14 schools. See Appendix B.
- When looking at our data, it should also be
- 22 noted that our growth is steady. We did not show any
- 23 unexplainable big jumps in growth due to political
- 24 pressures. We grew our students and teachers through

- 1 carefully scaffolding educational lessons and by
- 2 carefully bringing a scalpel to bad educational habits.
- 3 As Chief Transformation Officer Todd Babbitz
- 4 said, It takes time to turn around a school. In
- 5 comparison to AUSL's, Chalmers is taking that time.
- As an educator, I would worry when a student
- 7 can go from having an average of 46 on the test to
- 8 having an average of 85 on the test without substantial
- 9 proof as to how it was accomplished.
- Take this worry. Compound it by 14 schools in
- 11 two -- a two-year period for each school, Appendix C,
- 12 Chalmers' growth has increased due to the hard work and
- 13 dedication of the administration, teachers, students and
- 14 staff, and we continue to do so when given the
- 15 opportunity.
- If you [sic] are to be judged, let us be judged
- on the last two years, not the last six years. We've
- 18 been under new administration, and we are being judged
- 19 on what happened --
- 20 THE TIMEKEEPER: Please conclude.
- MS. HOLLOMAN: -- under the previous administration.
- 22 HONORABLE BATES: Before you sit down --
- 23 MS. HOLLOMAN: Yes.
- 24 HONORABLE BATES: -- I have a question for you.

- 1 There was an insinuation in your testimony just
- 2 then, and I want to know, are you talking about a
- 3 specific school, or -- or are you talking about AS --
- 4 AUSL schools in general?
- 5 MS. HOLLOMAN: AUSL schools in general.
- 6 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. All right.
- 7 Thank you.
- 8 MS. HOLLOMAN: Also --
- 9 Oh. She said I could conclude.
- 10 HONORABLE BATES: Oh. Your time is up.
- MS. HOLLOMAN: She said please conclude.
- 12 You told me to hold on.
- HONORABLE BATES: All right. Go ahead.
- Give her 30 seconds more.
- I really want to try to hear from everybody
- 16 though.
- MS. HOLLOMAN: Okay. I'll just say this. There has
- 18 been an increase --
- 19 HONORABLE BATES: If -- I don't want to get
- 20 Ms. Pope -- she's going to be mad so --
- MS. HOLLOMAN: There's been an increase enrollment
- 22 in Chalmers within this past 2012-2013 school year. In
- 23 the primary department alone, we have had two teachers.
- One come in October of 2012. One also coming in March

- 1 of 2013.
- 2 So, evidently, we are on the right track and on
- 3 the road to success. So we've already been turned
- 4 around. You can see improvement. It's just that I
- 5 believe and we all believe that somebody wants the
- 6 corner on Roosevelt and California.
- 7 Thank you.
- 8 HONORABLE BATES: All right.
- 9 Christine Decatus?
- I apologize if I butcher anyone's name.
- MS. DECATUS: No. You said it right.
- 12 Thank you.
- Good evening. My name is Christine Decatus,
- 14 C-h-r-i-s-t-i-n-e, last name D-e-c-a-t-u-s.
- 15 I'm employed at Chalmers as the school
- 16 counselor. I would like to submit for your
- 17 consideration the fact that our school was determined in
- 18 2012 to be well-organized for improvement by the My
- 19 Voice, My School Survey developed by the University of
- 20 Chicago.
- 21 That outcome is --
- 22 HONORABLE BATES: My Voice, My School?
- MS. DECATUS: My Voice, My School.
- That outcome is due to the much improved

- 1 climate of Chalmers since Dr. Nolen became our principal
- 2 in 2010.
- When I started at Chalmers in 2009, the
- 4 previous principal wouldn't let me counsel or provide a
- 5 curriculum or instructional support to classroom
- 6 teachers. She made me monitor the lunchroom all day.
- 7 That changed with Dr. Nolen. He gave me his
- 8 blessing to implement evidence debates, counseling
- 9 groups such as anger coping and SEABIT'S on my own and
- 10 with the partnership of other community agencies like
- 11 Youth Guid -- Youth Guidance and the psychologist of
- 12 Mount Sinai.
- Therefore, we care about the social-emotional
- 14 needs of our students and actively develop them through
- 15 direct instruction of coping skills, interpersonal
- skills while reassuring them with hope and optimism.
- Moreover, we care about our students' academic
- 18 growth as much. We have a great response to
- 19 intervention plan driven by data and differentiated
- 20 instruction.
- Last year, in an effort to make our students
- 22 more college and career ready, we aggressively prepared
- 23 them for the ACT Explore Test, a predictor of how well
- 24 students will do on the AC Test -- ACT Test in high

- 1 school, and the data showed that they grew from the low
- 2 teens to mid-20s.
- 3 Speaking of high school, one of our -- one of
- 4 my responsibilities is to have all the students eligible
- 5 for the selective enrollment test apply, and next year
- 6 we will be sending a student to Westinghouse High
- 7 School.
- 8 Keep in mind --
- 9 Keeping in mind that Dr. Nolen became principal
- 10 in 2010, our ISAT gains in 2011 and 2012 are comparable
- 11 to the ISAT gains of AUSL schools in our area like
- 12 Bethune, we are so close presently, we have 17 of the 21
- 13 points needed to go from a Level 3 to a Level 2, I'm
- 14 confident that, if you allow us to remain and continue
- 15 our work, our upward trains will increase and continue.
- 16 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 17 Come back to the microphone.
- 18 MS. DECATUS: Sorry.
- 19 I'm so nervous.
- 20 HONORABLE BATES: You -- You said that the 2012 My
- 21 Voice --
- MS. DECATUS: -- My School Survey.
- 23 HONORABLE BATES: I'm sorry.
- I'm sorry.

- 1 You said that the 2012 My Voice, My School
- 2 University of Chicago Survey rated your school what?
- MS. DECATUS: As well-organized for improvement.
- 4 And also satisfaction with our leadership,
- 5 satisfaction with our classroom, teachers and satis --
- 6 satisfaction with our environmental climate.
- 7 It should be included in one of our binders
- 8 with documentary evidence, the My School My --
- 9 HONORABLE BATES: Well, I'm certain it will be in
- 10 the transcript, but --
- MS. DECATUS: Right.
- 12 HONORABLE BATES: -- I -- take pretty copious notes,
- 13 and what's important in my mind is I hear it, but I want
- 14 it on this sheet of paper.
- MS. DECATUS: The My School --
- The My Voice, My School Survey is a survey
- 17 taken online by students sixth through eighth grade and
- 18 by parents and staff.
- And last year all our outcomes were positive
- 20 and very strong.
- 21 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- MS. DECATUS: You're welcome.
- 23 HONORABLE BATES: Ms. Pope?
- MS. POPE: Mr. Bates, while I hate to disappoint you

- 1 if you think I'm going to give you the same speech I've
- 2 been giving you for the last two days because I'm not
- 3 actually going to give you the same speech, this is the
- 4 final hearing, and I want to say something.
- I have noted a pattern, and I've been to five
- 6 out of six of the turnaround hearings now, and I have
- 7 noted a pattern.
- In many of these cases, we have new principals
- 9 who have been there no more than two years, in some
- 10 cases one year, and who've shown dramatic improvement,
- 11 who have staff, who have parents, who have students
- 12 testifying about how their schools are changing and
- 13 growing and developing.
- And then we have an extremely po -- politically
- 15 connected organization that takes a million dollars per
- 16 turnaround per year, and they are saying that they can
- 17 do better than these people who know and love and care
- 18 about the children. They're saying that they can do
- 19 better than the new leaderships, who you have heard
- 20 extraordinarily devoted testimony from.
- 21 As a union representative, I can tell you that
- 22 it's not every day that you hear the staff of a school
- 23 extolling the kindness, compassion, educational wisdom
- 24 and instructional leadership of their principals.

1	And I think you should take serious note of
2	this fact and the fact that it's not just here but with
3	a couple of the other schools as well.
4	And this is something that seems to be
5	disregarded by the district here, and I'm extremely
6	concerned about that. It seems to me that these
7	decisions are not being made on behalf of these kids.
8	These decisions are being made on behalf of politicians,
9	on behalf of people who have connections.
10	AUSL may be a nonprofit organization, but it's
11	a nonprofit organization that gets a whole lot of the
12	taxpayer money from the Board of Education.
13	And I just think it's extremely important for
13	And I just think it's extremely important for you to take into account that a school is not just a

- 1 So you'll fix it when you get up.
- 2 MR. OESTERREICHER: Jay Oesterreicher, J-a-y
- 0-e-s-t-e-r-e-i-c-h-e-r.
- 4 I've been in education for 28 years,
- 5 Mr. Hearing Officer, and I know one essential thing for
- 6 any school.
- 7 HONORABLE BATES: You're a teacher at -- at --
- 8 MR. OESTERREICHER: I'm a case manager.
- 9 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. At the school?
- 10 MR. OESTERREICHER: At the school.
- 11 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. Thank you.
- MR. OESTERREICHER: Yep. You're welcome.
- I've -- I've been at the school -- I want to
- 14 note that I was at the school four years prior to
- 15 becoming the case manager there as a mentor and a coach
- in a program called Fresh Start.
- 17 Fresh Start was offered to, I believe,
- 18 15 schools in the Chicago Public Schools as -- in lieu
- 19 of being turned around or closed, and it was a
- 20 mentorship program that the teachers and the faculty and
- 21 administration at Chalmers selected and a program that
- 22 lasted for four years.
- 23 And prior to the administration that's
- 24 currently at Chalmers, Chalmers was in trouble. The

- 1 students had -- they had behavior issues, academic
- 2 achievement issues and pretty much stagnated.
- 3 Since the coming of -- of this new
- 4 administration, I've seen immense changes in the
- 5 atmosphere, the climate, culture of the school, and as
- 6 you can see statistics, there is a trend upwards in test
- 7 scores.
- And the one thing I do want to note about
- 9 statistics is that they can be misleading. The
- 10 principal from Johnson showed an AUSL slide, very first
- 11 slide, that reflected the results of ten schools, but,
- 12 meanwhile, there are 25 schools in AUSL, and 15 of those
- 13 schools, the results of their first year to second year
- 14 were not posted.
- I think that one of the most important things
- 16 about Chalmers is, again, the leadership. And we're --
- 17 we're already in the process of being turned around, and
- 18 to start all over again would be very unfair to the
- 19 children.
- 20 I -- I can predict that having a whole new
- 21 staff and administration next year would leave the
- 22 school in upheaval, and I can't see academic achievement
- 23 taking place in the first or second year.
- So I -- to me, it makes so sense to turn around

- 1 Chalmers, the -- the process has already begun, and
- 2 that's -- that's all I have to say.
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 4 MR. OESTERREICHER: You're welcome.
- 5 HONORABLE BATES: Valerie Leonard?
- 6 Hold on one second, Ms. Leonard, please.
- 7 Okay. You may proceed.
- 8 MS. LEONARD: Hi. My name is Valerie Leonard. You
- 9 spell it V-a-l-e-r-i-e L-e-o-n-a-r-d.
- 10 I'm with the Lawndale Alliance and part of the
- 11 Committee to Save North Lawndale Schools. We advocate
- 12 for all of our schools on the list.
- I want to share some statistics with you.
- 14 Chalmers over the past three years has
- 15 increased in reading 15 percent, North Lawndale School
- 16 is 11 percent and citywide eight percent.
- At the same time, for math, we're looking at a
- 18 three-year growth of 48 percent, North Lawndale --
- 19 HONORABLE BATES: I'm sorry. Back up for a second.
- Over a three-year period, Chalmers 15 percent?
- MS. LEONARD: Yes.
- 22 HONORABLE BATES: Lawndale eight percent?
- 23 MS. LEONARD: That's --
- 24 No.

- 1 North Lawndale 11 percent.
- And, I'm sorry, I'll go a little bit slower.
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Okay.
- 4 The district?
- 5 MS. LEONARD: The district eight percent.
- 6 HONORABLE BATES: Okay.
- 7 MS. LEONARD: And with math, Chalmers' three-year
- 8 growth is 48 percent, North Lawndale 12 percent, and the
- 9 District is eight percent.
- 10 So that's significant growth just over the past
- 11 three years. And we'll just assume the third year is
- 12 the beginning of --
- 13 I'm sorry. We'll -- We'll just assume that the
- 14 three years began --
- Oh, I'm sorry. Let me just leave that point
- 16 alone.
- The one thing that you need to look at is the
- 18 fact that the mobility rate for Chalmers is extremely
- 19 high. For the City of Chicago, it's 18 percent, and for
- 20 Chalmers it's 53.79 percent.
- So that means, any given year, 47 percent of
- 22 the students either have just come in or they've just
- 23 come out. In three years' time, depending on whether or
- 24 not there's a core of students, the whole student body

- 1 can turn around.
- So there's significant starting over --
- 3 HONORABLE BATES: Give me the city number again.
- 4 MS. LEONARD: The city number is 18 percent.
- 5 HONORABLE BATES: And Chalmers is 53?
- 6 MS. LEONARD: That's correct.
- And, in spite of that, Chalmers is still making
- 8 steady process.
- 9 I -- I think that's really, really important.
- 10 And then, whether or not AUSL is a better
- 11 alternative, that's questionable.
- When you look at the AUSL schools in North
- 13 Lawndale, in reading and math, they're underperforming
- 14 North Lawndale averages.
- And then, in terms of this being a
- 16 predetermined solution -- conclusion, if you look at the
- 17 capital budget for 2013, the C -- CPS has already
- 18 outlined the eight schools that they want to turn around
- 19 and gave you the -- the budget amount.
- So how can you name the schools that you want
- 21 to turn around and the capital amount that's going to go
- 22 to those schools a year before you even have this
- 23 hearing?
- 24 That makes me wonder.

- 1 And then, in terms of me being a conspiracy
- 2 theorist, if you look at every action in North Lawndale,
- 3 it benefits AUSL and not our students.
- 4 Henson boundaries, even though they say that
- 5 we're going to Hughes School, only 40 percent are going
- 6 to Hughes School -- I'm sorry -- 30 percent going to
- 7 Hughes. Fifty percent are going to Herzl, which is an
- 8 AUSL school. Pope students are going to Johnson, which
- 9 is an AUSL school. Bethune is closing. That frees them
- 10 up to take over Chalmers.
- We can't let them take over Chalmers. Chalmers
- 12 is turning around.
- 13 THE TIMEKEEPER: Please conclude.
- MS. LEONARD: Chalmers is turning around, and we
- 15 don't need an AUSL to do it.
- 16 Thank you.
- 17 HONORABLE BATES: Now, Farina Dorsey?
- MS. DORSEY: Good evening.
- My name is Farina Dorsey. I'm a parent
- 20 volunteer at Chalmers School
- 21 My name is spelled F-a-r-i-n-a D-o-r-s-e-y.
- I understand that Chalmers is a school. I
- 23 understand it, as a government body of officials, you
- 24 all have the right to make decisions based upon facts.

- But as a citizen of the United State of America
- 2 and as a citizen of Chicago, I do not understand how a
- 3 government body of officials --
- 4 HONORABLE BATES: Speak into the microphone, please,
- 5 a little. Speak into that microphone, please.
- No, don't push it down. Pull it up.
- 7 Thank you.
- 8 MS. DORSEY: But as a citizen of the United States
- 9 of Chicago [sic] and as a citizen of Chica -- of
- 10 Chicago, I do not understand how a government body of
- 11 officials disregards the voice of the people.
- 12 Your government body should not have made a
- 13 decision -- have made a decision --
- 14 Your government body should -- Your government
- 15 body should not made a different -- should not have made
- 16 any difference by --
- 17 Hold on.
- 18 Your government body should not be that -- any
- 19 different than the body of the United States.
- I believe in the primary principle that a
- 21 government should be for the people, by the people.
- When government officials decided to listen to
- 23 the voice -- decided not to listen to the voice of the
- 24 people, it is no longer a democracy but a monarchy.

- When the mayor made the statement that it --
- 2 that it is no longer time for talk but it's time for
- 3 action, he decided that before hearing the voice of the
- 4 people.
- 5 There are many parents, teachers and officials
- 6 both local and statewide speaking in objections
- 7 concerning CPS Board decisions.
- 8 Go past that look.
- 9 I don't think you all should turn Chalmers into
- 10 an AUSL school because I have experience at an AUSL
- 11 school. My daughter, she goes to an AUSL school, which
- 12 is Collins Academy.
- 13 HONORABLE BATES: Which is what?
- MS. DORSEY: Collins Academy.
- And they're telling me that my daughter is
- 16 getting kicked out of their school because of her
- 17 behavior.
- 18 They basically said I need to find her
- 19 somewhere else to go because her behavior don't fit the
- 20 AUSL school.
- 21 And a lot of our kids at Chalmers have a
- 22 behavior problem. So what they going to do? Kick out
- 23 all the kids out of Chalmers, too?
- And then, as the principal at Johnson, I have a

- 1 nephew that attended Johnson, they used to stick him in
- 2 a blue room when he misbehaved.
- 3 So what are you all going to do to the other
- 4 kids that's in our neighborhood that misbehave? We
- 5 don't have a hundred blue rooms inside of Chalmers. So
- 6 what AUSL going to do?
- 7 THE TIMEKEEPER: Ma'am, please conclude.
- 8 MS. DORSEY: I don't think AUSL is a good thing for
- 9 Chalmers with family.
- We're on the rise. We have over 400 students
- in our school, 75 of them from the area. So, evidently,
- 12 the other 375 kids -- the other 325 kids not from the
- 13 area, and they parents choose for them to go to
- 14 Chalmers. That's because we have a good principal.
- 15 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you, Ms. Dorsey.
- 16 Stephanie Boyd?
- MS. BOYD: Good evening.
- 18 My name is Stephanie Boyd. It is spelled
- 19 S-t-e-p-h-a-n-i-e, and the last name is B-o-y-d.
- I am here tonight to speak to you about the
- 21 many accomplishments in literacy that Thomas Chalmers
- 22 Elementary School students have achieved under the
- 23 current leadership of Dr. Kent Nolen and his staff.
- 24 HONORABLE BATES: I think that makes you a teacher.

- 1 MS. BOYD: Yes.
- 2 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. You may proceed.
- 3 MS. BOYD: Thank you. Okay.
- 4 Dr. Nolen was given the charge in 2010 to begin
- 5 the process of leading and guiding the Thomas Chalmers
- 6 School community out of the status of being an
- 7 underperforming and underachieving school.
- Before Dr. Nolen took over as principal in the
- 9 fall of 2010, the school was on the decline in the area
- 10 of literacy.
- 11 Thomas Ele --
- 12 I'm sorry. Thomas Chalmers Elementary School
- in the spring of 2009 had 44.6 percent of their students
- 14 meeting and exceeding on the ISAT in reading. In the
- spring of 2010, that number dropped to 42.5 --
- 16 .5 percent of the students meeting and exceeding in
- 17 reading.
- Today, according to the 2012 spring results of
- 19 the ISAT, Chalmers Elementary School has 51.5 percent of
- 20 its students meeting and exceeding state standards in
- 21 reading.
- Dr. Nolen and the current teaching staff at
- 23 Chalmers have been able to increase the student reading
- 24 scores by almost ten percent in just two short years.

- In the area of computerized adaptive testing,
- 2 Chalmers students are showing tremendous gains in
- 3 reading.
- 4 This is our first year using the Northwestern
- 5 Evaluation Association Online Assessments, which is
- 6 better known as the NWEA test. Our students took their
- 7 middle-of-the-year assessment in January, just shortly
- 8 after returning back to school from winter break, and
- 9 according to those results, Chalmers School ranked among
- 10 the top ten schools in the Austin-North Lawndale Network
- 11 for targets met in reading.
- 12 Chalmers had almost 60 percent of its students
- 13 to meet or exceed their targets in reading. Our
- 14 percentage of students meeting or exceeding targets in
- 15 reading on the NWEA surpassed the percentage of students
- 16 meeting and exceeding targets at more than 20 other
- 17 schools in the Austin-North Lawndale Network.
- Dr. Nolen and his current teaching staff are
- 19 leading the students at Chalmers in the right direction
- 20 concerning literacy.
- We are moving and would like to continue moving
- 22 with Dr. Nolen and his staff, as President Barack would
- 23 say, forward.
- 24 Thank you.

1	HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
2	Wallace Wilbourn?
3	Before you start, just hold on a second at the
4	microphone.
5	You may proceed.
6	MR. WILBOURN: First name is Wallace, W-a-1-1-a-c-e,
7	last name Wilbourn, W-i-l-b-o-u-r-n.
8	I'm a concerned community resident in the area
9	of Chalmers.
10	Research conducted by the University of Chicago
11	Consortium on School Research shows that schools strong
12	in five essential areas, effective leaders,
13	collaborative teachers, ambitious instruction,
14	supportive environments and involved families are ten
15	times more likely to implu to improve student
16	learning than schools weak in these areas.
17	In 2012 students and teachers in Chicago Public
18	Schools participated in the CPS My School, My My
19	Voice My Voice, My School Survey, which asked
20	questions about their school's culture and climate.
21	Of the AUSL schools that had sufficient data to
22	be assessed, Sherman is not yet ready for improvement,
23	taken over in 2006; Harvard is not yet organized for
24	improvement, taken over in 2007; Dules is not yet

- 1 organized for improvement, taken over in 2010; Marquette
- 2 is not yet organized for improvement, taken over in
- 3 2012; Bethune is moderately organized for improvement,
- 4 taken over in 2009; Johnson is moderately organized for
- 5 improvement, taken over in 2009; Deneen is partially
- 6 organized for improvement, taken over in 2009; fuller is
- 7 partially organized for improvement, taken over in 2012;
- 8 Herzl is partially organized for improvement, taken over
- 9 in 2012.
- Now we'll get to good -- good stuff.
- 11 HONORABLE BATES: Stop. Stop.
- I want you to go back to the moderately because
- 13 I lost you after Bethune.
- MR. WILBOURN: Oh, okay.
- 15 HONORABLE BATES: So I just skipped the moderate
- 16 list and went into the partially.
- 17 MR. WILBOURN: Okay.
- 18 HONORABLE BATES: So I've got the not ready, and
- 19 I've got the partially, and I've got Bethune.
- What were the other two schools you said under
- 21 moderately?
- 22 MR. WILBOURN: Johnson is moderately organized for
- 23 improvement, taken over in 2009.
- 24 HONORABLE BATES: Just Bethune and Johnson?

- 1 MR. WILBOURN: For moderately, yes.
- 2 HONORABLE BATES: Okay. All right.
- 3 MR. WILBOURN: Okay?
- 4 HONORABLE BATES: You can proceed.
- 5 MR. WILBOURN: With partially?
- 6 HONORABLE BATES: No.
- 7 I got all of those.
- 8 MR. WILBOURN: Oh, okay.
- 9 Cassell is well-organized for improvement, and
- 10 Morton is well-organized for improvement. Bradwell is
- 11 also well-organized for improvement.
- 12 I think it's interesting that all of the AUSL
- 13 schools that are not yet organized for improvement are
- 14 schools that they mentioned for more than five years.
- It doesn't make sense to turn over a school to
- 16 AUSL, a school that is well-organized such as Chalmers,
- 17 to an organization that is incapable of maintaining
- 18 tho -- that standing.
- 19 Thank you very much.
- 20 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- Dr. Nelson [sic], your two speakers who yielded
- 22 their time, Veronica Bradley and Sarvitte Graham --
- MS. GRAHAM: Suvett (phonetic).
- 24 HONORABLE BATES: -- Suvett Graham, if they care to

- 1 speak, I'll give them one minute each.
- DR. NOLEN: Sarvitte Graham.
- 3 MS. GRAHAM: Good evening.
- 4 My name is Sarvitte Graham, S-a-r-v, as in
- 5 Victor, i-t-t-e. I am a local school council member,
- 6 committee --
- 7 HONORABLE BATES: Last name?
- 8 MS. GRAHAM: Graham, G-r-a-h-a-m.
- 9 HONORABLE BATES: Thank you.
- 10 MS. GRAHAM: I am a LSC member, I am a Chalmers
- 11 alumni, I am a parent, I am a community rep.
- 12
 I stand here tonight to tell you that Chalmers,
- 13 where we have been, we are no longer.
- Where we are now, you all at AUSL are trying to
- 15 fosterize our children.
- I had a nephew at AUSL, went from a B student
- 17 to an F student. Took him out, took him to Chalmers.
- 18 His grades have come up.
- 19 You all are not listen -- looking at 2010 when
- 20 Dr. Nolen and Ms. Banks came in. You all are looking at
- 21 from 2005, years prior to him coming in.

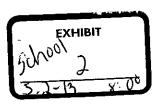

RE: The Matter of the Proposed Turnaround of Thomas Chalmers School

We the members of the Thomas Chalmers School Local School Council wish to thank you for this opportunity to be heard on the matter of the CEO's recommended action to Turnaround Thomas Chalmers School to the Board of Education of the City of Chicago. Please know that, all that we present today is what we, the elected Local School Council at Thomas Chalmers School believe is in the best interest of the children in attendance at Thomas Chalmers School.

We fought long, hard and most professionally to "Keep Chalmers Open" under the Public Debate around Space Utilization. Chalmers' Administration filed an appeal to the Boards published utilization rate but, never received a response. (Exhibit A) Nonetheless, we participated in two community forums and presented to CPS representatives, data which supported our position that the Boards published utilization rate was inaccurate. (Exhibit B) Following our participation in the two public forums on initial school actions based on space utilization, we were visited by members of the Space Utilization Commission. We did not hear anything more on the matter until Thursday, March 21, 2013 where we were informed that although Chalmers had been removed from the proposed school closure list, we had been recommended by the CEO to the Board to be a Turnaround school. Our entire school community was completely befuddled by this recommendation.

We are aware that agents of the CPS CEO are tasked to present data, encompassing a span of school years, inclusive of data from a prior Administration, with the intent to demonstrate chronic academic failure on the part of the current Faculty, Staff and Administration of Thomas Chalmers School over a number of school years. We are here to present quantitative and



qualitative evidence on the contrary, and in support of the current Faculty, Staff and Administration whom have operated for two complete school years.

In July 2010, we extended a 4 year Principal Performance Contract to our current Instructional Leader. (Exhibit C) His Principal Candidate Profile summary scores rate him amongst the best in CPS. (Exhibit D) Since his inception, we have had three different Area/Network Chiefs, and three different CPS CEOs, and three varying measures of student achievement, ISAT, Scantron and now NWEA. Each newly appointed Chief/CEO has had different priority goals and hence measures of student achievement.

Year 1, 2010-2011, Dr. Jennifer Cheatham AIO Area 9 singular Priority Goal was Reading Achievement and the Adoption of the Common Core State Standards. That year, we realized a 15% point improvement in the percent of children meeting/exceeding ISAT Reading Standards. This improvement represented the highest gain in Reading achievement in Area 9. (Exhibit E)

Year 2, 2011-2012 we are aligned to Mrs. Annette Gurley, Chief of Schools Austin North Lawndale Network who's Priorities were more global in perspective. That year one of many Priority goals was Science Achievement. That year in addition to being the only Early Adopter of the Common Core State Standards school in the Austin North Lawndale Network, we realized a 32.2% increase in the percent of students meeting/exceeding ISAT Science Standards. This improvement represented the highest gain in Science Achievement in the Austin North Lawndale Network. (Exhibit F)

Year 3, 2012-2013 this current school year, we now have Austin North Lawndale Interim Chief of Schools Chandra James. Although her independent Priorities are not clear, the most recent Achievement data available to CPS and Austin North Lawndale is the Middle of the Year NWEA data. This data is reflective of 64.8% of Chalmers' students meeting/exceeding their Middle of the Year growth targets. This places Chalmers amongst the best in our ability to take children from wherever they are academically and move them forward in the Austin North Lawndale Network. (Exhibit G) We realize we must continue to work to improve upon our students Performance compared to national norms and we are committed to doing just that. Through ongoing weekend Professional Development in partnership with the University of Chicago, DePaul University and Loyola University. The aforementioned accomplishments are

evidence of the fact that when priorities are set, not only do we meet, we are capable of exceeding them, with the neighborhood students we are enrolling.

Presently, we are four (4) Performance Points away from becoming a Level 2 School. This places us in the best position in attaining that status amongst the five sister schools the CEO has recommended for the same action. (Exhibit H)

Other measures of improvement under the current Faculty, Staff and Administration are as follows;

- A. Our Student Attendance rate is 96.6% compared to CPS 94.3%. (Exhibit I)
- B. Our Teacher Attendance rate is 97.6% compared to CPS 95.7%
- C. Our enrollment has risen from 240 in the Fall 2010 to 260 in Fall 2011, to nearly 390 present, representative of a 43% increase in student enrollment from 2011 to 2012.
- D. The results of the My Voice, My School Survey revealed that we were strong or very strong in each measured area. The survey result indicated that we are Well-Organized for Improvement. (Exhibit J)

We have been a welcoming school as evidenced by the drastic increase in our enrollment and our ability to make incremental increases in performance metrics. Many families have returned to Thomas Chalmers School from other nearby schools including schools managed by AUSL because this school community has been vocal and a collaborative part of the improvements that have taken place since the arrival of this current Administration. Over the past two years, we have established a solid foundation in Achievement, Attendance, Enrollment, Climate, Culture and Community Partnerships upon which to accelerate our improvement initiatives as outlined in our Continuous Improvement Work Plan. (Exhibit K)

Whereas the CEO's recommendation to Turnaround Thomas Chalmers School under the management of AUSL is concerned, notwithstanding data prior to the installation of the current Administration, the empirical evidence we have presented is in fact reflective of a Turnaround. The CEO has the wherewithal to recommend a Turnaround action in any given school year. It is our position that we be afforded more time with the current Faculty, Staff and Administration to build upon the foundation which has already been established.

We respectfully petition the Independent Hearing Officer to disagree with the recommended action and afford this current Faculty, Staff and Administration the opportunity to continue its work toward improving the Achievement outcomes at Thomas Chalmers. Further, we present the following as it relates to AUSL:

- AUSL presently has a saturated and unbalanced representation in the Douglass Park neighborhood of North Lawndale as evidenced by maps depicting AUSL managed schools. (Exhibit L)
- 2. As evidenced in AUSLs own Reports, Chalmers has out performed (based upon growth of incoming students) many AUSL managed schools to wit Bethune School which recruits from the same population of students that Thomas Chalmers School serves.(Exhibit M) Bethune composite Reading, Math and Science for 2012 is 48.4%, Chalmers composite is 54%. (Exhibit N)

In conclusion, of 30 schools in the Austin North Lawndale Network, 17 schools experienced a LOSS in the Composite percentage of students Meeting/Exceeding ISAT Standards. 13 Austin North Lawndale schools experienced Gains. Thomas Chalmers School experienced GAINS in both the percent of students who MET and the percent of students who EXCEEDED ISAT Standards. (Exhibit O) Nonetheless, we get it, we must accelerate the closure of the achievement gap between Chalmers, the Austin North Lawndale Network and the District. Considering where the school has come from post Fall 2010, under the current Faculty, Staff and Administration, much of the heavy lifting has already been accomplished. The data we have presented is representative of a foundation of achievement upon which we are prepared to catapult further achievement initiatives. If allowed to continue the work that we have begun, we clearly understand that, going forward, we must work with a greater sense of urgency.

This proposed Turnaround action may be re-imposed upon Thomas Chalmers School at the discretion of the CEO at any time. We pray that this Hearing Officer hold the current Faculty, Staff and Administration accountable for the work they have accomplished, not penalize them for work prior to Fall 2010 under a former administration and allow this current Faculty, Staff

and Administration more time to demonstrate its ability to do the work requisite in closing the achievement gaps by SAYING NO TO THE RECOMMENDED TURNAROUND ACTION.

This Uniform Principal's Performance Contract ("Agreement") is made and entered this 28 day of School Council at Chalmers School ("Local School Council") and 1 Ent 10 en ("Principal"). This Agreement sets forth the rights and obligations of the parties with respect to the employment of the Principal at ("the Attendance Center").

This Agreement is made pursuant to the provisions of the Illinois School Code, which are incorporated herein by this reference.

In consideration of the following promises, the parties agree as follows:

I. TERM

Principal is hereby employed by the Board of Education and agrees to serve for four years as the Principal at the Attendance Center commencing \(\frac{1}{20} \) \(

II. DUTIES OF PRINCIPAL

The Principal shall be the chief executive/operating officer of the Attendance Center. The Principal's duties shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- a) the Principal shall supervise the educational operation of the Attendance Center and shall assume administrative responsibility and instructional leadership, in accordance with the Rules, Policies and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to Rule or Policy of the Board of Education, for the planning, operation and evaluation of the educational program of the Attendance Center;
- b) the Principal's primary responsibility is the improvement of instruction at the Attendance Center;
- c) the Principal shall develop a Local School Improvement Plan ("Plan"), pursuant to the Illinois School Code, 105 ILCS 5/34-2.4, for the Attendance Center in consultation with the Local School Council, all categories of school staff, parents and community residents. The Principal shall then submit said Plan to the Local School Council for approval or disapproval;
- d) after a Plan has been approved by the Local School Council, the Principal shall be responsible for the implementation of the approved Plan;
- e) the Principal, with the assistance of the Professional Personnel Advisory Committee, shall develop the specific methods and contents of the school curriculum within the Board of Education's system-wide curriculum standards and objectives and the requirements of the Plan;
- f) the Principal shall develop an expenditure plan ("expenditure plan"), pursuant to the tilinois School Code, with respect to funds allocated and distributed to the Attendance Center by the Board of Education. The expenditure plan shall be developed in consultation with the Local School Council, the Professional Personnel Advisory Committee of the Attendance Center and all other school personnel. The Principal shall submit said expenditure plan annually to the Local School Council for approval or disapproval;
- g) after an expenditure plan has been approved by the Local School Council (or if the school has been placed on probation, pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/34-8.3, after an expenditure plan has been approved by the Board), the Principal shall be responsible for the implementation of the approved expenditure plan;
- h) unless prohibited by law or by Rule of the Board of Education, the Principal shall provide to the Local School Council copies of all internal audits and any other pertinent information generated by any audits or reviews of the programs and operations of the Attendance Center;

- i) the Principal shall direct, supervise, evaluate, and suspend with or without pay or otherwise discipline all teachers and other employees assigned to the Attendance Center in accordance with Board of Education Rules, Policies, and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to Board Rule or Policy and consistent with applicable collective bargaining agreements;
- j) the Principal shall direct, supervise, evaluate, and issue written disciplinary warnings to all assistant principals assigned to the Attendance Center in accordance with Board of Education Rules, Policies, and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to Board Rule or Policy and consistent with applicable collective bargaining agreements, however, only the Chief Executive Officer has the authority to suspend an assistant principal with or without pay;
- k) the Principal shall fill positions by appointment, and shall submit recommendations to the General Superintendent or Chief Executive Officer concerning the appointment, dismissal, retention, promotion, and assignment of all personnel assigned to the Attendance Center, as provided in 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1;
- I) the Principal shall attend academies or other training sessions mandated by the Board of Education and the Illinois State Board of Education;
- m) the Principal shall perform faithfully his/her duties and obligations as a member of the Local School Council of the Attendance Center;
- n) the Principal shall endeavor to maintain a positive education and learning climate at the Attendance Center;
- o) the Principal shall endeavor to establish clear lines of communication regarding school goals, accomplishments, practices and policies with the Local School Council, parents and teachers, and, unless prohibited by law or by Rule of the Board of Education, shall provide to the Local School Council information necessary for the Local School Council to perform its duties under the School Code;
- p) the Principal shall fulfill other obligations imposed upon the Principal by: the Illinois School Code; other applicable state and federal laws; Rules, Policies and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to Rule or Policy of the Board of Education; collective bargaining agreements; the desegregation consent decree; and other court decisions, decrees and settlements entered into by the Board of Education;
- q) the Principal may, in accordance with Board Rules, Policies and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to Board Rule or Policy including, but not limited to its Rule concerning conference leave, seek professional growth through collegial activities, attendance at professional meetings and the pursuit of further education.

Failure to perform the duties set forth in this Section may result in disciplinary action pursuant to Board Rules, Policies and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to Board Rule or Policy, and may constitute a material breach of this Agreement and cause for termination.

III. COMPENSATION

The Board of Education shall pay salary and provide benefits to the Principal in accordance with the Administrative Compensation Plan and the Rules, Policies and Procedures of the Board of Education, including all benefits for which full-time, regularly appointed certificated employees are eligible.

IV. EVALUATION

- A. Evaluation By Local School Council
 - (a) The Local School Council shall annually evaluate the Principal. The evaluation shall be in writing in a form prescribed by the Board of Education, which shall include the following criteria:
 - 1) student academic improvement, as defined by the school improvement plan;

- student absenteeism rates at the school;
- 3) instructional leadership;
- 4) the effective implementation of programs, policies, or strategies to improve student academic achievement;
- 5) school management;
- 6) any factors deemed relevant by the local school council, including, without limitation, the principal's communication skills and ability to create and maintain a student-centered learning environment, to develop opportunities for professional development, and to encourage parental involvement and community partnerships to achieve school improvement;
- 7) the Principal's fulfillment of his/her duties under this Agreement, including the duties specifically identified in Section II of this Agreement;
- 8) such other performance factors as are mutually agreed upon by the Principal, the Board of Education, and the Attendance Center's Local School Council in accordance with Section XI of this Agreement.
- (b) Not less than 150 days prior to the expiration of this contract, the Local School Council shall evaluate the Principal, in writing, using the Board approved evaluation form, to assess the educational and administrative progress made at the school during the term of this Agreement in order to determine whether to renew this Agreement. The Local School Council shall base its evaluation on the criteria set forth in Article IV(A)(a) above.
- (c) The Principal and the Local School Council shall meet at least once as the Local School Council gathers information to prepare its annual evaluation. The Local School Council shall send its signed, written evaluation, in the form prescribed by the Board of Education, to the Principal no later than May 1 during each year of this Agreement;
- (d) Within 30 days of the Principal's receipt of the Local School Council's signed, written evaluation, the Principal and the Local School Council may meet, upon request of either the Principal or the Local School Council, in executive session, to discuss the contents of the evaluation. As a result of that meeting, the Local School Council may, but is not obligated to revise its written evaluation. The Local School Council shall send a copy of its final evaluation to the Principal, with a copy to the General Superintendent or Chief Executive Officer, no later than June 15 during each year of this Agreement.
- B. Evaluation By General Superintendent or Chief Executive Officer
 - (a) The General Superintendent or Chief Executive Officer shall conduct an evaluation of the Principal based on the criteria set forth in Article IV(A) above. The evaluation shall be in writing in a form prescribed by, and pursuant to guidelines promulgated by, the Board of Education.
 - (b) The evaluation conducted by the General Superintendent or Chief Executive Officer shall be conducted annually, and shall be sent to the Principal and Local School Council.
- C. No evaluation pursuant to this Section shall be conducted until the Principal has been employed at the Attendance Center pursuant to this Agreement for at least one school semester.

V. CONTRACT TERMINATION

This Agreement may be terminated by the Board of Education before expiration of the term stated in Section I of this Agreement for any one of the following reasons or by any one of the following methods:

(a) written agreement of the Board of Education, the Local School Council and the Principal;

- (b) removal of the Principal for cause pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/34-85;
 - (c) closure of the attendance center or permanent merger of the attendance center into another attendance center;
 - (d) death, resignation or retirement of the Principal;
 - (e) misrepresentation referred to in section IX of this Agreement;
 - (f) revocation or suspension of the requisite certification to serve as Principal in the Chicago Public Schools;
 - (g) removal, reassignment, layoff or dismissal of the Principal to the extent permitted by 105 ILCS 5/34-8.3 and 105 ILCS 5/34-8.4 of the School Code.

VI. EXPIRATION

Unless terminated earlier, this Agreement, including and notwithstanding the procedures set forth herein, shall expire at the end of its stated term and shall not grant or create any contractual rights or other expectancy of continued employment beyond the term of this Agreement, except as indicated and solely to the extent provided in Section VII of this Agreement.

VII. RENEWAL AND NON-RENEWAL

- (a) The Local School Council shall decide whether to renew this Agreement with the Principal based upon the evaluation pursuant to Section IV A(b). The Local School Council shall notify the Principal of its decision regarding whether to renew this Agreement with the Principal in writing no later than February 1 of the calendar year in which this Agreement expires or, if the Principal's term expires on a date other than June 30, 150 days before expiration of this Agreement. Notice of the Local School Council's decision shall be made by personal delivery to the Principal or by registered or certified mail, and shall be deemed to have occurred on the date the Principal receives the written notice from the Local School Council. The Principal shall have no right to demand that the Local School Council make this decision earlier than the date set forth in this Section. In the event that the Local School Council fails to provide written notice of its decision in the manner set forth above by February 1 or, if the Principal's term expires on a date other than June 30, 150 days before expiration of this Agreement, then the Board may extend this Agreement for an additional year or appoint an interim principal at the Attendance Center until the Local School Council selects a new Principal to serve.
- (b) In the event that the Local School Council decides not to renew this Agreement with the Principal, the Local School Council shall, if requested by the Principal, provide in writing the reasons for its decision not to renew. The written reasons shall be provided to the Principal, with a copy to the General Superintendent or Chief Executive Officer, no later than February 22 of the calendar year in which this Agreement expires or, if the Principal's term expires on a date other than June 30, 128 days before expiration of this Agreement.
- (c) The Local School Council shall have no right to renew this Agreement with the Principal if the Principal fails to meet any requirement which is established or imposed by the Board of Education in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1 as a condition of the continued employment of the Principal or of the renewal of this Agreement with the Principal.
- (d) In the event that the Local School Council decides to renew this Agreement at the conclusion of the term stated in Section I of this Agreement, the Board of Education, the Local School Council and the Principal shall enter into a new Agreement for a term of four years pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/34-2.3 upon approval by the Board of Education of employment of the Principal and subject to the following condition.
 - 1) If the Principal failed to obtain a rating of "meets expectations" or "exceeds expectations" in the General Superintendent's evaluation for the previous year, and the Local School Council votes to renew the Principal's contract, a Local School Council member or members or the General Superintendent, within 15 days after the Local School Council's retention decision, may request a review of that decision, to be conducted in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/34-2.3. Such a review may be requested only once for that Principal at that Attendance Center.

- a) If the hearing officer, in light of the record developed at the hearing, determines that the Local School Council retention decision is arbitrary and capricious, the Local School Council decision will be set aside.
- b) If the hearing officer, in light of the record developed at the hearing, decides that the principal shall be retained, this Agreement shall be extended for a period of four years.
- The decision of the hearing officer is final and may not be appealed.
- (e) In the event that this Agreement is not renewed, the Local School Council shall be free to select another principal to serve under a four year performance contract as principal of the Attendance Center subject to the following condition.
 - 1) If the Local School Council fails to renew the performance contract of the Principal, and the Principal was rated by the General Superintendent in the previous years' evaluations as meeting or exceeding expectations, the Principal, within 15 days after the Local School Council's non-retention decision, may request a review of that decision by submitting a written request to the General Superintendent. The review shall be conducted in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/34-2.3(1.5) and (1.10). The Principal may request such a review only once while at that Attendance Center.
 - a) If the hearing officer, in light of the record developed at the hearing, determines that the Local School Council non-retention decision is arbitrary and capricious, the Local School Council decision will be set aside, and this Agreement shall be extended for a period of two years.
 - b) The decision of the hearing officer is final and may not be appealed.
- (f) Pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1, in the event that this Agreement is not renewed, the Principal's employment as a principal shall terminate upon the expiration of this Agreement, and he/she shall not be reinstated to any former position which he/she previously held with the Board of Education. However, the failure of the Local School Council to renew this Agreement with the Principal shall not limit the Principal from seeking and receiving other employment with the Board of Education based upon his/her experience and valid certifications and, if otherwise qualified under the Illinois School Code, his/her name shall be placed on appropriate eligibility lists which the Board maintains for teaching positions.
- (g) In the event that this Agreement is not renewed and the Principal does not retire or is not otherwise employed by the Board of Education after expiration of the term of this Agreement, the Principal shall be eligible to continue to receive his or her previously provided level of health insurance benefits for a period of 90 days following expiration of the term of this Agreement. Nothing in this subsection is intended to limit or otherwise impact the Principal's rights under COBRA or any other federal or state law concerning insurance.

VIII. SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this Agreement shall be considered severable and independent. If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall not be affected.

IX. REPRESENTATIONS

Include principal eligibility requirements in this section?

(a) The person signing this Agreement as Principal represents that he/she currently possesses the requisite certification to serve as Principal in the Chicago Public Schools, and that he/she meets any and all requirements for the employment or continued employment of such person as Principal which are established or imposed by the Board of Education in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1. In the event that the Board of Education subsequently finds that such person does not possess the requisite certification to serve as a Principal in the Chicago Public School System, or otherwise fails to meet any requirement established or imposed by the Board of Education in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1, this Agreement shall be deemed null and void, and the employment of the person signing this Agreement as Principal shall be terminated.

(b) If the person signing this Agreement as Principal is not an employee of the Board of Education at the time of signing, he/she represents: (1) that the information set forth in his/her employment application is true and accurate; and (2) that he/she has never been convicted of any of the enumerated criminal offenses set forth in 105 ILCS 5/34-18.5 of the Illinois School Code. In the event that the Board of Education subsequently finds: (1) that the information set forth in his/her employment application is not true and accurate; or (2) that he/she has been convicted of any of the enumerated criminal offenses set forth in 105 ILCS 5/34-18.5 of the Illinois School Code, this Agreement shall be deemed null and void, and the employment of the person signing this Agreement as Principal shall be terminated.

X. APPLICABLE LAW

This Agreement shall be interpreted and governed by the laws of the State of Illinois.

XI. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

- (a) This Agreement shall constitute the entire Uniform Principal's Performance Contract, and no additions, deletions or modifications may be made to this Agreement during its term unless made in writing and signed by the Board of Education, the Local School Council and the Principal. However, notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary this Agreement may be modified upon renewal pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1. Also, notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, the Board of Education may establish or impose requirements in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1 as conditions of the execution of this Agreement, and may establish or impose requirements in accordance with 105 ILCS 5/34-8.1 as conditions of the renewal of this Agreement. This Agreement supersedes all prior agreements, arrangements and communications between the parties dealing with the subject matter hereof, whether oral or written.
- (b) Nothing in subsection XI(a) above shall prohibit the Local School Council from negotiating additional criteria pursuant to 105 ILCS 5/34-2.3 of the Illinois School Code. Such additional criteria shall not discriminate on the basis of race, sex, creed, color or disability unrelated to ability to perform, and shall not be inconsistent with this Uniform Principal's Performance Contract, with other provisions of the Illinois School Code governing the authority and responsibility of principals, with Board of Education Rules, Policies or Procedures, or with court decisions or settlements affecting the Board of Education. Any additional criteria are subject to approval by the Board of Education's General Counsel, working in consultation with the organization representing Principals (currently the Chicago Principals and Administrators Association), for purposes of determining such consistency, and such criteria shall not be effective until they are so reviewed and approved, and executed by the parties in accordance with subsection XI(a) above.

XII. MISCELLANEOUS

- (a) This Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of any transferees, successors or assigns of the Board of Education. This Agreement may not be assigned by the Principal under any circumstances.
- (b) This Agreement is entered into solely for the benefit of the parties hereto, and any transferees, successors or assigns of the Board pursuant to subsection XII (a) above. This Agreement is not intended to confer any rights or impose any duties on any third party, and is not intended to expand the liability of any party hereto to any third party.
- (c) The Rules, Policies and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to Rule or Policy of the Board of Education promulgated to date are hereby incorporated by this reference, and to the extent that such Rules, Policies or Procedures are inconsistent with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the Rules, Policies or Procedures shall control.
- (d) The Rules and Policies and written Procedures promulgated pursuant to a Rule or Policy of the Board of Education promulgated during the term of this Agreement are hereby incorporated by this reference, except to the extent such Rules, Policies or Procedures are inconsistent with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, in which event the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall control.

ISAT: Growth vs. Similar Neighborhood Schools Since Turnaround Percentage Point Change 2009-2012

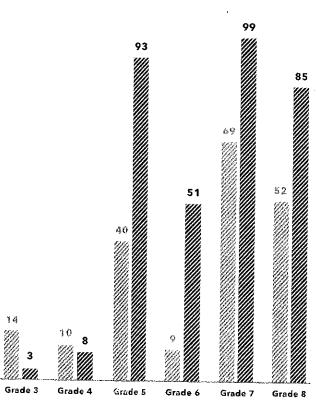

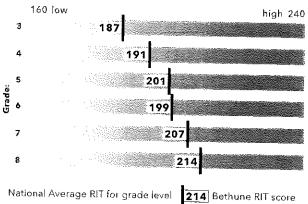

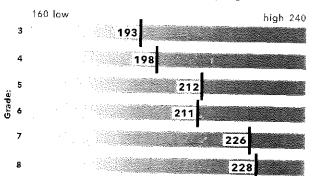
NWEA Average Student Percentile Growth Relative to Peers Nationwide: Fall 2011 to Spring 2012

The school provides extra -curricular activities such as roller skating, Dave and Busters and Old County Buffet, etc. The students get to experience pleasurable activities that they don't get to attend due to their current living situations.

Also, in speaking with the principal, Dr. Kent Nolen, his goal for the students of Chalmers is to provide a quality education to our students to enable them to become productive members of society and also afford them an opportunity to experience education at a higher level. We are a core set of teachers here at Chalmers. We do not exclude any students from the educational process. We are an inclusive school who accept students from around the Chicago land area. We have students from far south as 83rd and Houston, from far west as 4200 W. Roosevelt, from far east as 300 E. Cermak and far north as 1000 N. Augusta. We do not have or want the luxury of excluding students from our enrollment list. When other schools exclude students we openly receive these students with open arms. These students come to us with different educational levels and needs, we service them all. Most of our students are dealing with homelessness, parents who are unemployed or underemployed, poverty, incarcerated parents, parents who are affected by addictions, mental illness, and disabilities. This is just a snapshot of why some of our students were rejected from selective enrollment schools, charter schools and turn-around schools. It is no secret that when these students are rejected they still must be educated. We educators at Chalmers rise to this challenge daily. These students come to us feeling rejected and looked down upon, we accept and service them. These students know that we at Chalmers respect and genuinely care for them and in return respond beautifully. They have an attendance record of at least 96%. When a student feels wanted and loved they perform better. We are a core set of teachers who teach. It is advantageous to a teacher when students are educationally sound. Teachers cannot fully demonstrate their ability to teach, when, students who are before them are already running full sprint to the proverbial college and career ready finish line. When a teacher can service an underperforming student to a level whereby they begin to feel as if they have hope for a brighter future, then you see how much that the teacher is worth. This is what we do here at Chalmers.

We accept these students, nurture these students and ultimately grow these students. Our data reflect how we have grown these students. We have been on the underperforming school list

for six years. I have been employed at Chalmers for four years. During the last two years, we have demonstrated growth, despite students' everyday difficulties. So much growth that during the 2012 ISAT, Chalmers School was just four points away from being removed off the underperforming school list. This is in spite of having an above average class size. This is in spite of having students with physical and emotional limitations. According to data retrieved from the website www.iirc.niu.edu (see appendix A and B), Chalmers has made steady improvements for the last two years. The last two years should be the data reviewed as we have been under a new administrator inasmuch years.

Our school climate has changed. Our students and teachers are more focused, data driven, and results oriented. During the last administration of the ISAT, our growth as a school grew by 1.4 percent according to ISBE. The sub-region had a decline of 6.3 percent. The district grew by 0.9 percent. The state grew by 0.1 percent (see Appendix A). The growth of our school outpaced our counterparts. In comparison to the proposed turnaround school AUSL, our school growth outpaced seven of their 14 schools (See Appendix B). When looking at our data, it should also be noted that our growth is steady. We did not show an unexplainable big jump in growth due to political pressures. We grew our students and teachers through carefully scaffolding educational lessons and by carefully bringing a scalpel to bad educational habits. As chief transformation officer Todd Babbitz said, "It takes time to turnaround a school". In comparison to AUSL schools, Chalmers is taking that time. As an educator, I would worry when a student can go from having an average of 46 on a test to having an average of 85 on a test without substantial proof as to how this was accomplished. Take this worry, compound it by 14 schools in a two year period for each school (Appendix C). Chalmers growth has increased due to the hard work and dedication of administrator, teachers, students and staff and we continue to do so when given the

opportunity. If we are to be judged, let us be judged on the last two years.

Chalmers has been an early adopter of Common Core State Standard. Chalmers School has been involved with preparing CCSS lessons for the last two years. We are an early adopter school of the Common Core State Standards. The current administration has provided teachers with multiple opportunities to attend Common Core State Standards professional developments within the district. We have been involved with professional developments in differentiated instruction. We have been involved with professional development for conflict resolution.

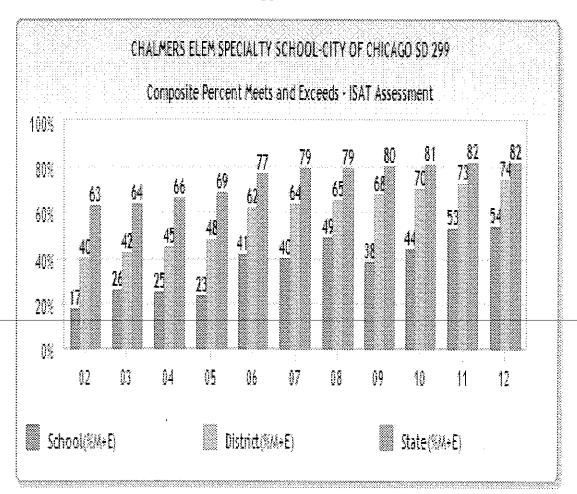
Drawing on these skills is how we grow our students and grow our school. Barbara Byrd Bennett on a recent interview on WBBM program named "At Issue" stated that she does not like the terminology of tiered schools. She stated that, in a classroom, there could be many different levels in each classroom; this is the case at Chalmers. In one, classroom, there could be as many as four different grade levels. Chalmers teachers rise to the challenge to educate each of these students. We differentiate instruction to ensure that every child has a quality education.

Your records may show that we are an underperforming school. We differ with that terminology. Our data demonstrates that we are a school which is quickly on pace to becoming a tier two school. Our data demonstrates that our students are being educated. On the NWEA winter assessment, our students collectively grew at an average pace of 53.7 percent. This 53.7 percent increase is in line with comparable schools. This increase is also in line with our past performance. The data reflects that each year, each teacher and each student are making gains towards improvement. I along with the administration, LSC, parents, teachers, students, staff and visitors who visit the school all agree, we are a school moving in the right direction. It may appear that we are underperforming because of the lack of skills of a certain population of students. Despite the effort of this population of students, their inability to grasp, certain

concepts is often beyond their control.

The students and teachers at Chalmers do apply themselves and are still making improved gains. There is an impressive 61.8 percent gain in reading and an impressive 78.5 percent gain in mathematics in third grade alone, these students are making improvements in their education. These are those same students who are rejected by AUSL schools, charter schools, and selective enrollment schools. We are proud of these students for not giving up on themselves when others have given up on them. Telling students, that despite their best effort they are still underperforming; just further depresses, alienate and lower students' self worth. Asking these students to become college and career ready in two or three years time would be placing an undue amount of pressure on them. When they are consistently told they are not college and career ready, they will begin to display their disdain in one fashion or another. Students who are consistently transferred from school to school because of their lack of skills just adds insults to injury. I/we ask for at least a year to truly evaluate the effectiveness of this administration and the work of the teachers and students.

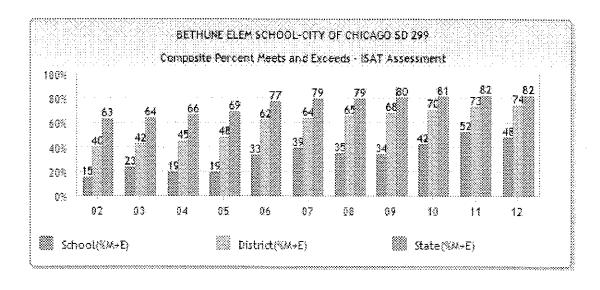

## Public Comments to CPS Regarding the Proposed Closure of Chalmers School (May 2, 2013

My name is Valerie Leonard, the Co-Founder of the Lawndale Alliance. We are a group of residents who have come together to address issues of concern to the community, including education, TIF reform and mortgage foreclosure. We are also members of the Committee to Save North Lawndale Schools. We are here today to provide testimony against the proposed turnaround of Chalmers Elementary Specialty School by AUSL.

CPS has provided four primary reasons for the proposed turnaround of Chalmers: 1) "Over the last 6 years, Thomas Chalmers Specialty Elementary School(Chalmers) has been on probation and has not made the progress necessary to take it off probation. 2) "We want to provide students with the opportunity to access a high-quality education and get on a path to success in the classroom.." and " create a culture of success at Chalmers in order to give all students the high-quality education they deserve. " 3) "The results of these turnaround schools in Chicago have been remarkable — for example, the percent of students at elementary turnaround schools that met standards last year improved twice as fast as the CPS district-wide average. 4) "We want to provide your child with access to the same opportunities to boost their chance of academic success, which they will receive next school year if this proposal is approved.

With respect to point 1), regarding the fact that the school has been on probation and has not made sufficient progress, we ask that you consider the fact that education is a developmental process, and that the current principal, Dr. Kent Nolen, has only been at the school 3 years. In his short tenure, the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in reading increased from 44.6% to 51.5%. This represents a 6.9 point difference (15% growth), as compared to 6.2 (11% growth) for North Lawndale, 5.6 points for the district (8% growth), and 4.9 points for charter schools (7% growth). Likewise, the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in math increased from 37.3% to 55.1%. This represents a 17.8 point difference, (48% growth) as compared to 7.6 points (12% growth) for North Lawndale, 6.9 points (9% growth) for the district and 6.1 points for charter schools (8% growth). Clearly, Dr. Nolen is a man with a plan, and it is working. There is no need for a takeover from AUSL.

An Education Week article on student mobility has indicated that the potential impact of mobility on students' education is significant. Students who move often between schools may experience a range of problems such as: lower achievement levels due to discontinuity of curriculum between schools, behavioral problems, difficulty developing peer relationships, and a greater risk for dropping out.

Although little research has been conducted on the impact of student mobility on non-mobile students, schools with significant incidences of student mobility also report an impact on their non-mobile students, teachers, and overall school climate. For example, a policy brief published in 1999 by Policy Analysis for California Education, found that California schools with high mobility rates (30 percent or higher), reported that test scores for non-mobile students were considerably lower than those of students in schools with lower mobility rates. The findings

support claims that continual student turnover is disruptive and keeps non-mobile students from moving ahead as teachers spend extra time helping newer students catch up. Some schools have attempted to alleviate this by keeping highly mobile students (i.e. children of migrant workers) segregated from other classes, so that the continual arrival and departure of mobile students does not disrupt the education of other non-mobile students (Hartman, 2002).(Education Week 2004)

Chalmers is in an area of Lawndale with an increasingly significantly transient population, due to a number of factors, including family issues, a shortage of affordable housing and the mortgage foreclosure crisis. A number of students live in homeless shelters. The student mobility rate has increased from 27.7% in 2001 to 42.6% in 2012. This represents a 53.79% increase in mobility for Chalmers The average mobility rate for all Chicago Public Schools was 25.2% in 2001 and 18.3% in 2012. This represents a 27.38% reduction in mobility for CPS students across the district. During this time, Chalmers has seen 160.10% growth in the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in reading as compared to 89.18% for the district. Chalmers has experienced a 262.50% increase in the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in math, as compared to a131.32% increase for the district.

With respect to point 3) regarding the remarkable results of the AUSL turnarounds, we cannot say that AUSL provides better option at this time. While it is true that AUSL schools have made significant gains relative to district averages, the AUSL North Lawndale co-hort has not outperformed district averages or North Lawndale averages in reading or math. (See Charts 1 and 2).

Chart 1. ISAT Reading Scores: North Lawndale Schools and AUSL Schools

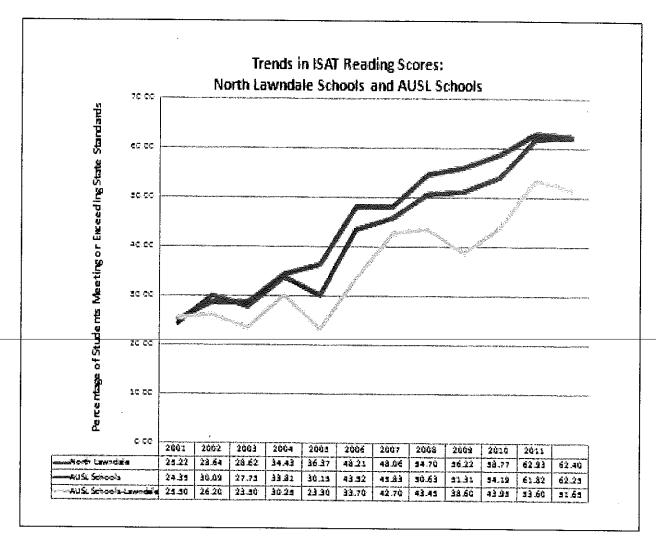
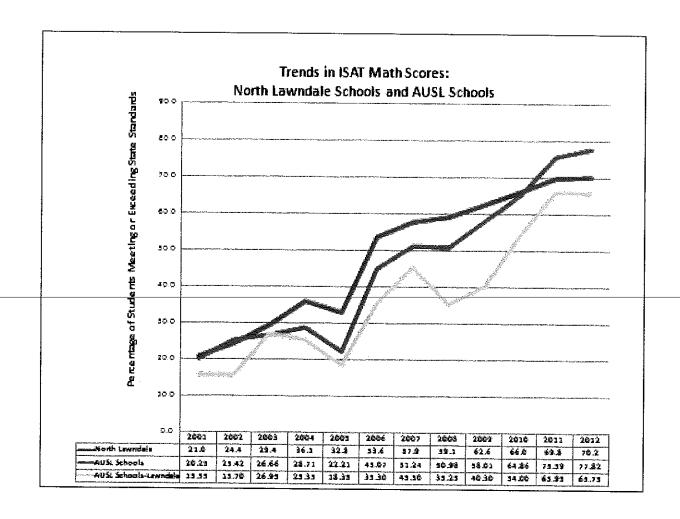


Chart 2. ISAT Math Scores: North Lawndale Schools and AUSL Schools



Finally, we wish to express our deep concern that every school closure and turnaround action in North Lawndale, with the exception of Paderewski School, centers around consolidating schools into the AUSL portfolio. Henson school, which is a very well-resourced level 3 school, will close. Publicly, CPS has said that the receiving school is Hughes, which is a level 2 school. A closer inspection of the new attendance boundaries reveal that only 30% of the old Henson attendance boundary will be in the new Hughes attendance boundary. About 20% of the old Henson boundary will fold into the Webster boundaries, while a whopping 50% of the Henson attendance boundary will go into Herzl, which is an under-utilized level 3 school that is exempt from co-location because it's managed by AUSL. Henson has more community resources to support students, children and families than any other school in North Lawndale.

When we look at the area around Douglas Park, we see that Bethune, which is located on Arthington, will close, and fold into Gregory School (level 1). Parents have cited safety concerns regarding gang territories, and have publicly stated that they will not send their children to Gregory. They will more than likely send their children to another AUSL school like Johnson or Chalmers (assuming it is taken over by AUSL).

Closing Bethune will free capacity for AUSL to take over Chalmers, and effectively replace Bethune with Chalmers, which is a higher performing school that is very well managed and located across the street from the northeast corner of Douglas Park. Pope School, located across the street from the southwest corner of Douglas Park, will merge into Johnson, an AUSL-managed school that is located across the street from Douglas Park on 14th and Albany. AUSL already manages Collins, located in Douglas Park. After the proposed closures and consolidation of schools, AUSL will control all the public schools in and around Douglas Park, including Johnson, Chalmers and Collins High School. (Note: One of the North Lawndale College Preparatory Charter High School sites shares the building with Collins).

Residents also question the independence of the decisions being made, given the fact that CPS Board President Vitale is the former AUSL board chairman, and Tim Cawley, Chief Administrative Officer at CPS, is a former AUSL executive. After the consolidation is done, AUSL will control EVERY school in Douglas Park will be controlled by AUSL. On top of that, CPS has not shared any plans for the empty Pope School building. No one wants to see an empty school building in the community, as empty buildings are magnets for all manner of illicit activities. As it is, North Lawndale has over 1,700 vacant buildings and lots. We do not need another. In closing, we respectfully request once more, that Chalmers be allowed to continue its own turnaround without being taken over. We also request that Bethune be allowed to remain open and complete the turnaround they started two years ago.

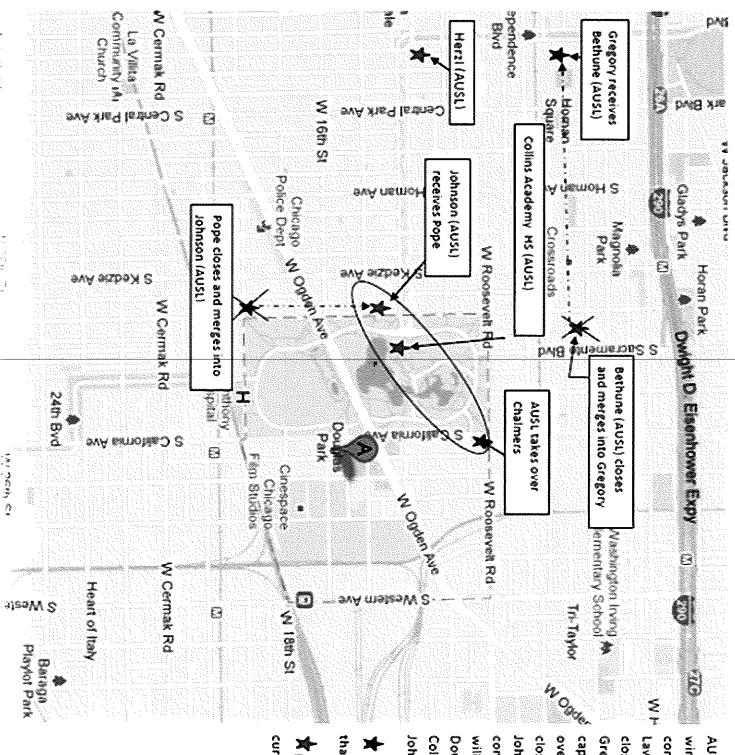

With respect to point 1), regarding the fact that the school has been on probation and has not made sufficient progress, we ask that you consider the fact that education is a developmental process, and that the current principal, Dr. Kent Nolen, has only been at the school 3 years. In his short tenure, the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in reading increased from 44.6% to 51.5%. This represents a 6.9 point difference (15% growth), as compared to 6.2 (11% growth) for North Lawndale, 5.6 points for the district (8% growth), and 4.9 points for charter schools (7% growth). Likewise, the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in math increased from 37.3% to 55.1%. This represents a 17.8 point difference, (48% growth) as compared to 7.6 points (12% growth) for North Lawndale, 6.9 points (9% growth) for the district and 6.1 points for charter schools (8% growth). Clearly, Dr. Nolen is a man with a plan, and it is working. There is no need for a takeover from AUSL.

An Education Week article on student mobility has indicated that the potential impact of mobility on students' education is significant. Students who move often between schools may experience a range of problems such as: lower achievement levels due to discontinuity of curriculum between schools, behavioral problems, difficulty developing peer relationships, and a greater risk for dropping out.

Although little research has been conducted on the impact of student mobility on non-mobile students, schools with significant incidences of student mobility also report an impact on their non-mobile students, teachers, and overall school climate. For example, a policy brief published in 1999 by Policy Analysis for California Education, found that California schools with high mobility rates (30 percent or higher), reported that test scores for non-mobile students were considerably lower than those of students in schools with lower mobility rates. The findings

support claims that continual student turnover is disruptive and keeps non-mobile students from moving ahead as teachers spend extra time helping newer students catch up. Some schools have attempted to alleviate this by keeping highly mobile students (i.e. children of migrant workers) segregated from other classes, so that the continual arrival and departure of mobile students does not disrupt the education of other non-mobile students (Hartman, 2002).(Education Week 2004)

Chalmers is in an area of Lawndale with an increasingly significantly transient population, due to a number of factors, including family issues, a shortage of affordable housing and the mortgage foreclosure crisis. A number of students live in homeless shelters. The student mobility rate has increased from 27.7% in 2001 to 42.6% in 2012. This represents a 53.79% increase in mobility for Chalmers The average mobility rate for all Chicago Public Schools was 25.2% in 2001 and 18.3% in 2012. This represents a 27.38% reduction in mobility for CPS students across the district. During this time, Chalmers has seen 160.10% growth in the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in reading as compared to 89.18% for the district. Chalmers has experienced a 262.50% increase in the number of students meeting or exceeding state standards in math, as compared to a131.32% increase for the district.

With respect to point 3) regarding the remarkable results of the AUSL turnarounds, we cannot say that AUSL provides better option at this time. While it is true that AUSL schools have made significant gains relative to district averages, the AUSL North Lawndale co-hort has not outperformed district averages or North Lawndale averages in reading or math. (See Charts 1 and 2).

Chart 1. ISAT Reading Scores: North Lawndale Schools and AUSL Schools

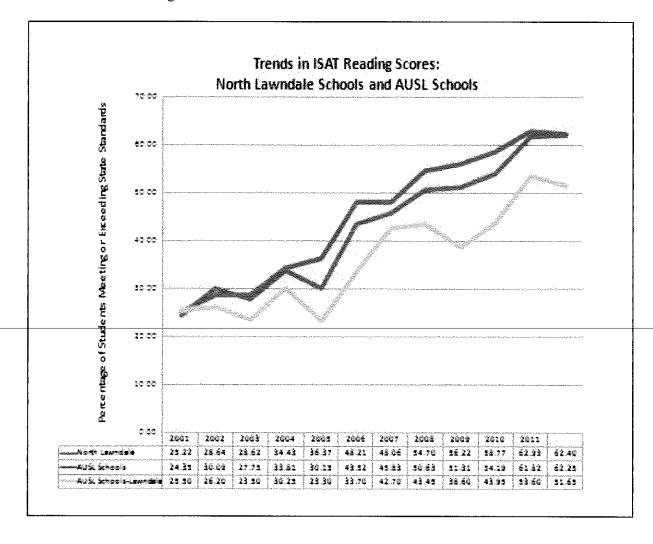
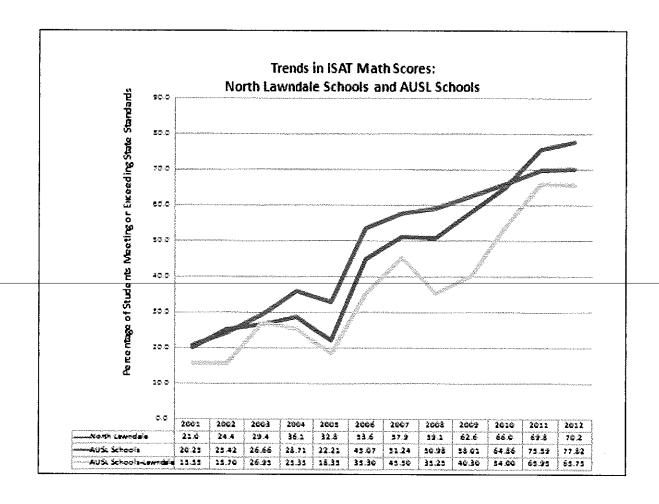


Chart 2. ISAT Math Scores: North Lawndale Schools and AUSL Schools



Finally, we wish to express our deep concern that every school closure and turnaround action in North Lawndale, with the exception of Paderewski School, centers around consolidating schools into the AUSL portfolio. Henson school, which is a very well-resourced level 3 school, will close. Publicly, CPS has said that the receiving school is Hughes, which is a level 2 school. A closer inspection of the new attendance boundaries reveal that only 30% of the old Henson attendance boundary will be in the new Hughes attendance boundary. About 20% of the old Henson boundary will fold into the Webster boundaries, while a whopping 50% of the Henson attendance boundary will go into Herzl, which is an under-utilized level 3school that is exempt from co-location because it's managed by AUSL. Henson has more community resources to support students, children and families than any other school in North Lawndale.

When we look at the area around Douglas Park, we see that Bethune, which is located on Arthington, will close, and fold into Gregory School (level 1). Parents have cited safety concerns regarding gang territories, and have publicly stated that they will not send their children to Gregory. They will more than likely send their children to another AUSL school like Johnson or Chalmers (assuming it is taken over by AUSL).

Closing Bethune will free capacity for AUSL to take over Chalmers, and effectively replace Bethune with Chalmers, which is a higher performing school that is very well managed and located across the street from the northeast corner of Douglas Park. Pope School, located across the street from the southwest corner of Douglas Park, will merge into Johnson, an AUSL-managed school that is located across the street from Douglas Park on 14th and Albany. AUSL already manages Collins, located in Douglas Park. After the proposed closures and consolidation of schools, AUSL will control all the public schools in and around Douglas Park, including Johnson, Chalmers and Collins High School. (Note: One of the North Lawndale College Preparatory Charter High School sites shares the building with Collins).

Residents also question the independence of the decisions being made, given the fact that CPS Board President Vitale is the former AUSL board chairman, and Tim Cawley, Chief Administrative Officer at CPS, is a former AUSL executive. After the consolidation is done, AUSL will control EVERY school in Douglas Park will be controlled by AUSL. On top of that, CPS has not shared any plans for the empty Pope School building. No one wants to see an empty school building in the community, as empty buildings are magnets for all manner of illicit activities. As it is, North Lawndale has over 1,700 vacant buildings and lots. We do not need another. In closing, we respectfully request once more, that Chalmers be allowed to continue its own turnaround without being taken over. We also request that Bethune be allowed to remain open and complete the turnaround they started two years ago.

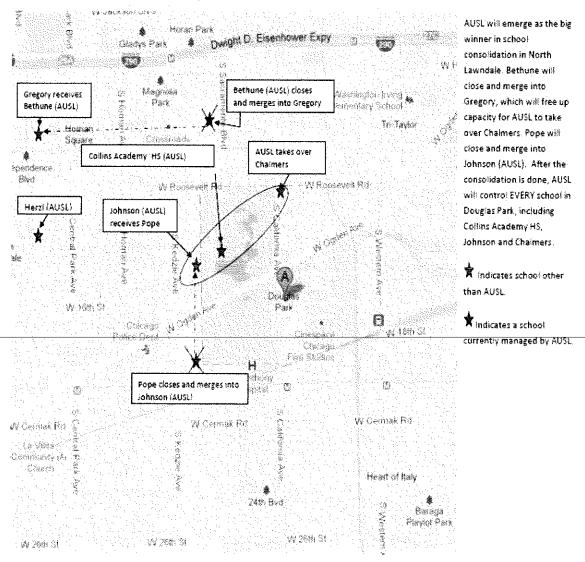

### Closing Schools in North Lawndale is Not Providing Better Alternatives

As we enter the final stretch of the race to close down a record number of schools in the nation, we are extremely concerned about the patterns that are emerging in North Lawndale. We find that capital costs used to justify closing North Lawndale schools have been inflated up to 3 times. Moreover, there are no capital projects in progress at the schools slated to be closed, and they are in excellent condition. We have also found, consistently, that CPS has misrepresented the amenities of the closing schools. In most instances, the closing schools have greater amenities than the receiving schools. For example, CPS has said that Pope and Henson don't have computer labs. Henson has two technology labs, a library and a computer in every classroom. Pope has a technology lab and a media center.

Community residents have questioned whether the proposed school closings are providing cover for AUSL to consolidate their interests in North Lawndale. Bethune, an AUSL school, will close before being completely turned around. This will free capacity for AUSL to take over Chalmers, situated across the street from the northeast corner of Douglas Park. Pope, situated across the street from the southwest corner of Douglas Park, will close, and Johnson, which is an AUSL school, will assume its boundaries. Johnson is situated across the street from Douglas Park on 14th Street. AUSL controls Collins High School, situated inside the Park. After the dust settles, AUSL will control essentially every school in or around Douglas Park. While Henson's receiving school is Hughes, the new attendance boundaries are drawn such that the lion's share of Henson students will go to Herzl, another AUSL school. CPS Board President Vitale is the former board president of AUSL. CPS Chief Administrative Officer, Tim Cawley, is a former managing director of AUSL. While we believe schools should be improved rather than closed, it should be noted that AUSL schools do not necessarily present better options. AUSL school in North Lawndale have historically under-performed the North Lawndale Average.

School Closings will "re-segregate" the African American and Latino communities around Paderewski School, and will not provide better opportunities for African American students. Currently, Paderewski is the only North Lawndale school whose attendance boundaries include North Lawndale and Little Village. Paderewski's student population is 82% African American and 18% Latino. African American students generally live in Lawndale, north of Cermak Road, while the Latino students generally live in Little Village, south of Cermak Road. Even though CPS has designated Cardenas and Castellanos as receiving schools for Paderewski, the new attendance boundaries for Cardenas and Castellanos are drawn such that the northern boundary is Cermak Road. Likewise, the southern boundary for Penn and Crown is Cermak. Effectively, Latino students will be sent to Cardenas or Castellanos while African American students will go to Penn or Crown. Cardenas is Level 1 and Castellanos is Level 2. Cardenas and Castellanos are nearly filled to capacity. Paderewski, Crown and Penn are all Level 3 schools, with Paderewski being the strongest performer of the three.

In closing, we ask that CPS put a moratorium on school closures until they can complete their master facilities planning process, mitigate any conflicts of interest and change any plans that could compound segregation. Sincerely,
