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MR. JOHNSON: Well, good afternoon, Everybody. Let's call this meeting to order.

I am "Chip" Johnson, the Chief of Family & Community Engagement & Education. You usually see my face in these kind of settings.

Standing next to me is the Chief of Network 16 Megan Hougard, who's been my colleague for some years now and now the Chief of the High School Network.

And we are bringing together in front of all of you our colleagues, CPS colleagues here. And I'm happy that we do have one alumni from John Hope. Again, this is bittersweet for me because I spent 12 years of my career at John Hope as well.

So we're talking about the proposed closure of John Hope. Now, we know right now there are no students in the school, just Mr. D., Mr. Durr, Mr. D. and, of course, things are being wrapped up at the school. So we're here to talk about what we're going to do and what the legal process is that we follow when we go through proposed closures.

So you'll see that we have the proposed -- the presentation on the school action that Chief Hougard will present, and then we're going to open it up for public comment from 5:45 until 7:00.

However, seeing that there's only one person here to speak, after that public comment has ended, then we will, if there are no other speakers that come into the room or that sign up to speak, then we will adjourn the meeting. Okay?

I will hand this over to Chief Hougard.

MS. HOUGARD: All right. Thank you.

As Chief Johnson said, we'll do a short presentation based on the school action and then have public comment.

We are happy to answer other questions after the scheduled public comment concludes as well.

So the school action process is a process guided by the State. The legal process that's outlined begins October 1st. CPS publishes the draft guidelines around the school actions, and then before December 1st, CPS needs to propose -- make public the school actions and send notice letters and draft transition plans.

In January then there are two community meetings held. In February or later, there's an actual hearing at the Board Chamber. That's also a public hearing in front of a school action judge, and then the Board will vote after that.

The proposed school action is to close

Hope High School effective July 1st, 2020. There are currently no students in Hope, and with no further Board action, the School would close effective July 1st, 2021. That's already been voted on and passed by the Board.

As we talk about this process, the new Englewood High School that's very close to here was opened this fall. That is the hundred million dollar investment in a community high school for Englewood that encompasses the boundary of Hope, Robeson and Harper High School.

And there's always some questions around TEAM Englewood. TEAM Englewood did not have an attendance boundary. It's a citywide high school.

So at the end of last school year,

Hope High School had 20 enrolled students. At this time
all 20 students have transferred to other CPS schools of
their choice. That was before the school year started.

Students who transferred received ongoing transition supports, funds were made available to each of the receiving schools that was \$6,100 per student in transfer funding, and we also continue to provide support, academic support, socioemotional support, transportation support to all of the former Hope students who have transitioned to other CPS

schools.

And this begins our process for public comment. So we have Ms. Nevins in the front who has the time guidance.

And, Judy, are you going to call our speakers?

MS. CAMACHO-CAMPBELL: Yes.

So there's currently one speaker. So Speaker 1 can come up.

MR. FERGUSON: Good evening, Everyone. My name is Derrick Ferguson. I'm a product of John Hope. I'm actually one of the members of the John Hope Alumni that we formed about five years ago.

My concern was when I -- when we found out the school was closing, well, first, we see that the railroad bought up all the property over there. This has taken away from John Hope.

I grew up at a time when we had families over there on 55th and Normal up to 59th. And with them buying up the property, the families are gone, they basically took out a community. So now there's no students to go to John Hope because their families are gone.

So me personally, I think that was wrong. So, John Hope, we support our school, and, you know, I'm

kind of nervous because I'm not used to speaking, okay, like this, it's a shame that it happened.

And my question is; why couldn't the school be like retrofitted or something else done to it instead of just letting it go? I know a charter school was in it, but could anything have been done to stop this, to attract more students in order to keep it open instead of shipping the property -- I mean, shipping families and everything around? So that's just my concern about it.

I drive through the neighborhood almost every day, and it's a shame to see how our neighborhood went down, the families taken away, and now, you know, things are happening to the school.

So that was just my concern and the John Hope Alumni concern because we love our schools. I'm a product of John Hope. I came out in '84. I know that's a while ago, but still a lot of us love our school. A lot of beginnings come from John Hope.

So I just -- I'm concerned about it.

Thank you.
