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HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Good evening, Ladies and gentlemen. My name is Francis Dolan, and I'm an attorney licensed to practice in the State of Illinois and a retired State of Illinois Judge.

Before we begin, I want to note that there are two interpreters in the front of the room; one for the Spanish language and one for sign language. If you need these services, please connect with these individuals.

On or about September 15, 2019, the Board of Education contracted with Judicial Conflict Resolution, Inc., for hearing officers to preside over hearings scheduled pursuant to Illinois Revised Statute 534, 230. Recently, I was retained through Judicial Conflict Resolution, Inc., to serve as an independent hearing officer in this matter.

The purpose of this hearing is to enable me to receive public comment from concerned persons, specifically including representatives of the CEO, the school community, interested members of the public concerning the CEO's proposal to close TEAM High School located at 5515 South Lowe Street, Chicago, Illinois.

Notice of the scheduling of the hearing for today, Wednesday, the 29th of January, 2020, at 5:30 p.m. at the Board of Education of the City of

Chicago, 42 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, was served upon the public by newspaper publication in the Chicago Sun-Times. Additionally, the information concerning the scheduled date was published on the CPS internet website.

Pursuant to said notice, this hearing was scheduled to begin at 5:30. And let the record reflect that we are beginning at 5:32.

Pursuant to the directives provided in the document entitled Procedures for Public Hearings on Proposed School Closure Consolidation Phase-Out, Reconstitution or Reassignment Boundary Change, the Hearing Officer is solely responsible for conducting the hearing and is to conduct the hearing in an efficient and impartial manner. So there are some guidelines that I would ask everyone to follow and respect.

This is a public hearing. Therefore, I will respect all in attendance to show courteous, respectful and civil behavior.

Please at this time turn off your cell phones or put them on vibrate. Also, please turn off any electronic devices that at this time could disturb these proceedings.

This is an opportunity for public comment

Page 6 1 concerning the CEO's proposal. It is not an opportunity 2 for questions and answers. 3 Please do not clap or cheer if you agree with a 4 witness or a speaker's testimony. Similarly, do not boo 5 or make any other negative verbalization if you are opposed to what a witness or a speaker has to say. 7 Please understand I am not an employee of the 8 Chicago Public School System or the Board of Education. I will conduct an orderly hearing, and I will show 10 respect to each speaker, and I ask that you respect me and the serious purpose of this meeting by honoring the 11 12 quidelines I have just set forth. 13 I will first receive comments from 14 representatives from the Chicago Public Schools 15 concerning why the CEO is proposing to close TEAM High 16 School. 17 MS. BRIZUELA: Your Honor, I would just like to 18 clarify this is for Hope High School. 19 HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Excuse me. 20 I stand corrected. Hope High School. 21 And did I get the address wrong? 22 No, I have the address right, do I not? 23 MS. BRIZUELA: Yes, the address is correct.

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right. So let the record reflect, thank you, Counsel, so it's for Hope, Hope High School. And to be certain that the record is clear, we are here tonight concerning the CEO's proposal to close Hope High School located at 5515 South Lowe Street in Chicago, Illinois.

After I hear from the CEO's representatives, excuse me, I will hear from any elected officials in attendance if any are in attendance. Then those individuals who have signed up to speak this evening one hour prior to the start of the hearing and within 30 minutes after the start of the hearing will be called to speak primarily in the order in which they have signed in. So testimony will be heard in this matter until all who have signed in to be heard by 6:00 p.m. have been heard or until we have reached 6:30 p.m., whichever occurs first.

Individuals who have signed in to speak during the designated hours to do so will each be given two minutes to present their comments. This limitation is to ensure that we have sufficient time to hear all the speakers.

There are lights that are located on the top left side of the podium. The green light indicates your two minutes have begun to run, the yellow light appears

when you have 30 seconds remaining in your time and the red light indicates your two minutes have expired.

Please respect the red light and return to your seat when it appears.

A certified court reporter is seated right down in front of me here, and she is here to translate everything that is being said at this hearing. Please understand, she cannot record two people speaking simultaneously. Therefore, only one person can speak at a time, and I will determine who that person is.

If I have a question for you while you are speaking, please stop speaking and do not begin to answer my question even if you think you know what I am going to say until I have finished asking the question.

When you are called upon to speak, please step up to the microphone at the podium, state your name for the record and spell your first and last names so the court reporter can take it down correctly. Please then state your affiliation; for example, which school you are from, what community, organization, if you remember a parent and so forth.

I don't know if there are going to be any -Well, there won't be any students because I think there
are no students in the school at this time

understandably.

When you are speaking, please do so in a conversational tone. The transcript of this proceeding, which I will be using to fulfill my duty, will not include any loud or aggressive language or movements. So please everybody help us so we have a clear record of this proceeding.

Following the public hearing, pursuant to state law and the rules promulgated by the Board governing this hearing, I will prepare and submit to the CEO a written report that summarizes the public comments and documents received in today's hearing and determines whether the CEO complied with the requirements of state law and the Final Guidelines for School Actions. The CEO will include my report and any recommendation submitted to the Board.

Finally, the record in this case will remain open until 5:00 p.m. tomorrow, Thursday, January 30th, for persons to submit any written materials they want me to consider and make a part of the record.

Let me repeat that again. The record of this case will remain open until tomorrow, 5:00 p.m.,

So if you are a speaker and your two minutes expired and you still have more information you wish to make a part of the record, you may write it down and submit it via hand delivery or e-mail.

Materials submitted after 5:00 p.m. tomorrow will not be considered in my recommendation and report and will not be included in the record of this hearing.

That concludes my opening comments.

Counsel, you may proceed.

MS. BRIZUELA: Good evening, your Honor. My name is Gabriela Brizuela, G-a-b-r-i-e-l-a B-r-i-z-u-e-l-a. I am an attorney in the Chicago Board of Education's Law Department.

I'm appearing before you today in connection

with the proposal of the Chief Executive Officer or CEO of the Chicago Public Schools to close Hope High School referred to as "Hope".

At this time I offer CEO's compiled Exhibit 1, a binder of documents already tendered to you and being submitted for your consideration in support of the proposal.

A copy of this binder is also available here in the boardroom on the podium to my right for public viewing.

The binder consists of documentary evidence and written statements demonstrating that the CEO's proposal complies with the requirements of the Illinois School Code and the CEO's Guidelines for School Actions.

Specifically the written documents and statements demonstrate the following:

At Tab A, the binder includes Notice Letters to the staff and local school council members of Hope accompanied by the Draft Transition Plan.

The Notice Letters and Draft Transition Plan describe the bases of the proposal, explain how the proposal meets the criteria of the guidelines and identifies supports for the transition.

Tab A also includes two affidavits. The first

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attesting to proper publication of the Draft Guidelines for School Actions on September 30th, 2019, the list of qualified independent hearing officers on October 22nd, 2019, the Finalized Guidelines for School Actions following a 21-day public comment period, the proposal before December 1st, 2019, and at least 30 calendar days before the first community meeting and summaries from community meetings within five days after the meeting. The affidavits also attest the delivery of notice to the Hope staff, local school council members and elected officials.

Finally, Tab A includes notice of the scheduled community meetings and hearings published in the Chicago Sun-Times Newspaper.

At Tab B, the binder includes the Illinois
School Code Provisions designating the powers of the
Board and outlining the process for school actions.
This tab also includes the Board's policy on the review
and establishment of school attendance boundaries as
well as the Board school quality rating policy.

Also Tab -- Also, at Tab B are the CEO's Guidelines for School Actions for the 2019-2020 school year.

And, finally, Tab B includes the CEO's

procedures for public hearings on proposed school closings.

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At Tab C, the binder includes written evidence in support of the CEO's proposal. Tab C contains the transcripts and summaries for two community meetings to elicit public comment held at a location convenient to the Hope High School community.

Tab C also includes three written statements. The first is of Network Chief Megan Hougard introducing the action and providing support for the proposal. The second written statement is of Dr. Stephanie Jones, the Chief Officer of the Diverse Learner Supports and Services. The third statement is of Bing Howell, Chief Portfolio Officer for the Chicago Public Schools providing additional information relevant to space utilization.

At this time I request that the CEO's Compiled Exhibit 1 be admitted into the record.

HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: No objection. It will be admitted.

MS. BRIZUELA: Thank you, your Honor.

I would now like to ask permission to call the CEO's first representative.

Network Chief Megan Hougard will make a

statement in support of the proposal. This statement is located in the binder at Tab C17.

HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Please.

MS. HOUGARD: Good evening, your Honor.

THE COURT: Good evening.

MS. HOUGARD: My name is Megan Hougard, M-e-g-a-n H-o-u-g-a-r-d, and I am the Network Chief for Network 16 for Chicago Public Schools. Chicago Public Schools are divided into Networks. Hope High School, known as Hope moving forward, is a neighborhood high school located in Network 16, and I am responsible for the support and oversight of Hope on behalf of the CEO. Prior to being a Network Chief, I was a teacher, administrator and deputy chief. I have been Hope's Network Chief since October 2015.

The Chicago Board of Education voted in February 2018 to close Hope effective July 1st, 2021, due to declining enrollment. This closure, and the accompanying transition support plan, was part of the district's nearly \$100 million investment in a new state-of-the-art Englewood STEM high school.

The February 2018 decision to close Hope effective July 1st, 2021, was made to allow students enrolled at that time to graduate from Hope. The

original closure timeline and transition support plan was developed based on an extensive community engagement process involving community meetings, parent meetings, a public hearing and regular discussions with elected officials and the Englewood Steering Committee.

After the Board voted in February 2018 to close Hope, CPS staff mobilized to implement the accompanying transition support plan. From March to September 2018, CPS staff met individually with each Hope student to discuss their academic plans and high school options for school year 2018-'19. Through this process, CPS gave students the choice to remain at Hope or transfer to a higher performing school of their choice with parental consent. The majority of the student population of Hope chose to transfer to a higher performing school of their choice. During the 2018-2019 school year, the only students remaining at Hope were students with disabilities in a special education cluster program.

At the end of last school year, Hope had 20 students enrolled. As you will hear next from my colleague Dr. Stephanie Jones, the Office of Diverse Learner Supports and Services worked with families to ensure all students were placed in a cluster program that met their unique needs before the start of school

year 2019-2020. As of November 1st 2019, Hope had zero students enrolled.

Without any current students to serve, the Chief Executive Officer is proposing to close Hope ahead of July 1st, 2021.

The current proposal to close Hope effective

July 1st, 2020, meets the criteria of the Chief

Executive Officer's Guidelines for School Actions

because student enrollment as of November 1st, 2019, was

zero.

It should be noted that Hope students who transferred after -- after the Board's February 2018 decision are receiving a variety of transition resources. Each of the schools that welcomed Hope students received \$6,100 per transfer student per year in supplemental funding to provide academic, social and emotional and other supports to students during school year 2018-'19 and school year 2019-2020. CPS continues to support former Hope students with this transition. This funding and support will also continue in school year 2020-2021.

The schools that received Hope students completed a rigorous transition support planning and budgeting process during the summer of 2019. As a part

Page 17 1 of this process, the district provided these schools 2 with student profiles, held a budget and planning 3 workshop for schools and had subject matter experts 4 review and approve all school support plans and budgets. 5 Currently, Hope has zero students enrolled, 6 and, thus, I recommend that the Board approve the CEO's 7 recommendation for closure. 8 Thank you, your Honor. This concludes my 9 statement. 10 HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Thank you. 11 Counsel? 12 MS. BRIZUELA: Your Honor, I would now like to ask 13 permission to call the CEO's next representative, 14 Dr. Stephanie Jones, who will make a statement in 15 support of the proposal. 16 Dr. Jones' statement is located in the binder 17 at Tab C18. 18 HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Please. 19 DR. JONES: Good evening, your Honor. 20 HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Good evening. 21 DR. JONES: My name is Dr. Stephanie Jones. 22 the Chief Officer of Diverse Learner Supports and 23 Services, also known as ODLSS. In this capacity, I

oversee the District's efforts to serve approximately

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52,000 students with disabilities. My office supports individual students in all schools to ensure students with disabilities receive meaningful and relevant access to grade level core instruction suited to their unique learning needs within their neighborhood school, school of choice or the closest school to their residence. I have been the officer for this department since August of 2019.

By way of background, prior to being appointed to my current role, I served as -- I served as the director of special services at South Holland School District 151, where I liaised between educators and community partners for the past five years. Prior to that, I served as a special educator teacher and case manager at Air Force Academy High School and George Washington Carver Military Academy High School. I have a bachelor's degree in psychology and master's degree in special education from -- both from Lewis University as well as a doctorate in leadership in educational administration from Capella University.

The current proposal to close Hope High School effective July 1st, 2020, meets the criteria of the Chief Executive Officer's Guidelines for School Actions because student enrollment as of November 1st, 2019, was

zero.

As you have already heard, during the 2018-'19 school year, the only students remaining at Hope were students with disabilities in a special education cluster program. The Illinois School Code requires a district to designate a school with 100 percent students with disabilities as a separate special education facility and the students' Individual Education Program must indicate 100 percent removal from the general education to a separate school. However, the Illinois State Board of Education identified as -- also known as ISBE, granted a waiver from the state regulations to allow the students to remain in Hope for the 2018-'19 school year.

At the end of last school year, which was 2018-'19, Hope had 20 students with disabilities enrolled. Prior to the expiration of the waiver, my office worked with families to ensure all students were placed in a different cluster program within a district that met their unique needs before the start of the school year 2019-'20. As of November 1st, 2019, Hope had zero students enrolled.

Additionally, students with disabilities and their families have been supported in the transition

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process by my office through continual support for academic instruction and ensuring that schools that welcomed students are fully capable of implementing a student's IEP. Students with disabilities, as with all students affected by school actions, receive intensive support to ensure their academic and social-emotional needs are met. By law, these supports include free and appropriate public education, the implementation of the student's IEP in the least restrictive environment and focus on student academics and social-emotional progress.

To ensure that instructional quality was maintained during the transition process, CPS provided the following support:

The Office of Diverse Learners and Support
Services known as ODLSS appointed a district
representative to serve as the point of contact for all
students and families. The ODLSS district
representative worked with families and students to
ensure that they were informed about their options and
provided support throughout the process of transitioning
to their new school.

From December 2018 to January 2019, district representatives reviewed all IEP's for students with

disabilities at Hope and supported decision-making on the selection of the best school for students for school year 2019-20. Informational meetings with impacted students and families were organized by the ODLSS staff.

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ODLSS worked with students in the cluster program at Hope to relocate students to other optimal cluster programs that met their individual needs for school year 2019-'20.

In conclusion, Hope has zero students enrolled, and, thus, I recommend the Board -- that the Board approve the CEO's recommendations for closure.

Thank you for your time and attention. This concludes my statement.

HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Thank you.

MS. BRIZUELA: Thank you, Dr. Jones.

Your Honor, I would now like to ask permission to call the CEO's next representative Bing Howell, who will make a statement in support of the proposal. This statement is located in the binder at Tab C19.

HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Please, sir.

MR. HOWELL: Good evening, your Honor.

HEARING OFFICER DOLAN: Good evening.

MR. HOWELL: My name is Bing Howell, and I am the Chief Portfolio Officer for Chicago Public Schools. My

office's responsibilities include undertaking school demographic studies, enrollment projections and the monitoring of space utilization of the public school facilities throughout Chicago. I have been in this position since November 4th, 2019.

The Chief Executive Officer, or CEO, has asked me to appear at this hearing today to convey to you, the parents, staff and school community of Hope High School or Hope as well as interested members of the public in attendance information relevant to the proposal to close Hope.

According to the CEO's Guidelines for School Actions for the 2019-2020 school year, the CEO may propose a closure if the student enrollment of -- as of November 1st, 2019, was zero students.

Hope is located at 5515 South Lowe Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, zip cope 60621. Hope is an open enrollment high school serving students in 11th and 12th grades. Hope's enrollment as of November 1st, 2019, was zero students. No students are projected to enroll for the 2020-2021 school year. Because no students will be transitioning to a new school -- to a new school as a result of this proposed closure, it is not necessary to identify a higher performing welcoming school.
